Ordinary Business

The Question of the consideration of tenders for clothing was then brought under the notice of the Board by the Chairman who read a Memorial from Mr. James O'Flaherty woolen Draper complaining of the great injustice done to him by the Board having invited tenders for clothing to be considered by the clothing Committee Messrs. Cliffs, Founder. Merchant and Callan on Wednesday the 4th Inst. when he sent in samples of all the articles advertised for. That they were on that day opened and most of them adopted as the cheapest and best value before the Committee. That he was surprised to find that at the Boards meeting on the following day a majority of the Board had decided not to accept what had been recommended by the Committee but to issue new advertisements for the same articles to be received and considered this day, that he had acted in accordance with the rules laid down for all who are invited to put in tenders to the Board, that altho but one other party put in tenders and samples before the Committee on that day all the drapers in town were invited by public advertisement to do so, that this not having done so was not his fault, but it has been stated as a reason for their not doing so they did not expect fair play from the Committee as memorialist had sufficient influence on them to induce them to decide in his favor or in other words to lend themselves to do a job on his account, that the high character of the Committee sufficiently repelled such insinuations. That it was further asserted by new customers and dealt with him which he regretted was not the fact, that to receive tenders this day would place him at a serious disadvantage his goods having been all opened and prices made public and no instance of the kind was known to have occurred at this respectable Board before. He buys his goods at the best and cheapest market and feared no competition from his fellow traders provided all were placed on a level but that for the above reasons he would now be placed in an unfair position and begged the Board would confirm the recommendation of the Committee.

 On 1st June Died 162, Discharged cured 56, sent to Fever  
 and Pestilential Hospital 9, Died 3. That he was told  
 the Female children go out to walk many evenings on the  
 Roads, would recommend a walk thru towns & visit for  
 the same class in a grass field for about an hour which

Called the attention of the Board to the necessity of having the Piers at the front entrance of the Workhouse taken down, and rebuilt as they are at present too low which prevents the Gates from being locked, thereby leaving the premises exposed.—Ordered. That the Master get the piers raised.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as

That as the erection of Draps on the Male and Female Schools, is under consideration for some time past, he wished to be informed in what manner the Board intended having them put up, as they are undergoing material injury by lying on, and thus acting at the same time as a shield from the children.

Ordered. That Mr Murphy the Building Contractor has got an order to have them put up on rollers.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others were read by the Clerk and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

Dated 18th July 1857. Expressing their approval of the acceptance by No 57354. the Guardians of the Indian Mills? Caspar & Ettingham for doing certain repairs on the Poor Hospital,

19th July 1857. Enquiring if the Average cost includes the maintenance No 364 of Draps in the Workhouse Infirmary and Poor Hospital.

Ordered. It does.

23rd July 1857. Transmitting Questions to be answered by the person No 40486. who may be appointed Master Mason to the Workhouse.

23rd July 1857. Expressing their approval of the Guardians No 40486. proposal to reduce the Salary of the Assistant Relieving Officer from £40 to £30 & Allowance.

A Letter was read from the Commissioners of National Education forwarding extracts from their Inspector's report of the 7th Inst on the state of the Schools of the Workhouse which was to the following effect.  
 "The Teachers are fairly qualified as regards both their literary acquirements and their method of conducting the business. A very fair general improvement has taken place since my last visit - consisting in the progress of the classes - the formation of a 4th class in the Male School - also marked progress in Geography & Grammar, in both departments.

## Ordinary Business.

In reference to the Commissioners' Letter of the 16<sup>th</sup> Inst requesting the Board to call on Doctor Hay to stand in his resignation on Medical Office of the Workhouse.

— After much consideration the following Resolution was Moved by J. Power Esq<sup>r</sup>  
Seconded by J. Power Esq<sup>r</sup>. P.P. and agreed to unanimously.

Resolved. That upon a full consideration of the Commissioners' letter in reference to the investigation held by Mr Phelan into the Medical department of the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of this Union we feel confident it will be attended with beneficial results — we beg at the same time to express our regret that the Commissioners should have deemed it necessary to advise us to call on the Medical Officer to resign; for whilst he has fallen into errors of judgment which have appeared more striking from want of sufficient regularity in keeping his Medical Books — we very respectfully beg the attention of the Commissioners to the statements of facts which appear to us to constitute matter for serious consideration in this case.

We find that the Average number of patients in the Workhouse Infirmary to have been last October 86. November 95. December 131. January 162. February 213. March 252. and April 210. that Doctor Hay did frequently report to us the want of sufficient accommodation for the sick, that owing to the very crowded state of the House which arose principally from the suspension of Out Poor Relief during the Winter — we were unable to make the provision the Doctor required of us and that therefore we must hold ourselves in some degree accountable for a portion of the consequence — that from the very severe pressure of his duties by day and night he caught influenza the latter end of February but notwithstanding the rep against its effects until his ~~weak~~ constitution naturally good has at length given way and the results appear to us at this moment alarmingly doubtful — that we look upon Doctor Hay as an intelligent attentive Officer who has always kept the department over which he presided as clean and as comfortable as the

Circumstances of the House permitted, and whose labours and successful care of the sick may be well attested by the fact that in a House with an average number of Sixteen hundred and Fifty five the average mortality during the previous six months did not exceed Seven in the week. That amongst his recoveries there were cases to our own knowledge of a seriously complicated and difficult nature which he treated with very great success.

That under all these circumstances are in the full confidence that the results of the investigation are the reprimand which the Board now give will ensure for the future the greatest regularity in the Hospital books and an exercise of a sound discretion, which couples with the usual attention which Doctor Hay has shewn, and the confidence he has inspired in the inmates of the Workhouse Infirmary — will produce all the benefits that could be expected from a new appointment — we respectfully beseech to adopt the advice given us by the Commissioners.

We therefore earnestly beg that the Commissioners will reconsider his case in connection with the facts we put before them, and confidently hope when they have done so, they will alter their judgment in his regard and ultimately agree with us in the adoption of a merciful course.

Mr Cullin gave notice that on the day fortnight he will more agreeably to the suggestion of Mr Phelan that an Apothecary is required to the Infirmary of this Workhouse and that advertisements were for candidates to fill that situation.

A Note was read from Doctor Hay requesting the Board would extend leave of absence for 3 weeks further at the end of his leave and the Clerk to communicate the Resolution of the Board to Doctor Hay at the same time to state to him that they feel bound in duty to censure the irregular mode of keeping his books and their anxious desire that in future this department of his duties shall be more punctually discharged.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

The Medical Officer of the New Hospital reported that the Ditch at the Hospital required to be floored and tendered in a specification and tender from John Cosgrave who is now repairing the Hospital.

Ordered. That the Ditch be floored with such Boards and joists 3 + 2 inches for the sum of 17/- and that the sum of 5/- be allowed for removing the partition which will give increased accommodation.

A Statement was read from Anne Burke that her father Edward Burke now in America had paid the passage of himself and Sister Mary Burke and the certificate of same was produced. praying the Board to Memorial the Government for remission of the punishment of her Sister Mary now in Wexford Jail for larceny of some clothes in this house lately, in order both may go out together to their father.

Ordered. That the Clerk draw up a memorial to the Lord Lieutenant stating the facts and express the desire of the Guardians the term of her Confinement as under the circumstances they do not press for the entire sentence passed at last Quarter Sessions of Jersey to be carried out.

The Agriculturist reported that he had transplanted all the Leek plants he had and having room for much more suggested writing to the Wexford House for about 3000 as that quantity would complete his plot.

That he went up to Major Blachers about the Deal poles to make a stand for a Hay Rake and found they will be sent to the House at the rate of 3/3 per dozen 20 feet long.

Ordered. That the Clerk write to the Master of the Wexford House for the Leek plants and offer Cabbage Plants in exchange for same at a fair value and that 25 dozen of the Leek poles be procured at the price quoted for making round the Hay Stand.
