That several Guardians having expressed their surprise at the large amount of Rates said to be required for this Union to meet the expenses of the current, as compared with other Unions, and some instances having lately occurred exhibiting serious irregularities with respect to a most important Branch of the management viz, that connected with the collection of rates and the issuing of proper receipts and the fact of duplicate receipts bearing the Clerks initials being in possession of a Collector & Clerk — that the Commissioners be requested to direct an immediate enquiry into the matter.

The Clerk informed the Board that he was desirous an enquiry take place having yesterday seen receipts with Mr. Mull the collector which left no doubt in his mind that they bore his initials. That he had applied for another close Office twelve months since but that the Board took no steps for fitting up one and the members from time to time asked to go to the Office for private deliberation and left it open afterwards. He hoped he would be able to show that on his part there was no moral guilt in this very serious charge.



Ordered. That Anty Quinn be admitted to the Workhouse as belonging to the Union, a note written to Doctor White that Eliza Younge belonged to the Gorey Union and that Dr White's servant should accompany her to that Workhouse and for the increase expence of so doing she be allowed to retain the £7 sent with her by Dr White to the Relieving Officer.
