## Ordinary Business

The Committee appointed on last Board day, to meet on Tuesday the 18th Inst, respecting the making of Rates reported, that having made by went into the necessary calculations assisted by the Clerk to make proper Rates on the Electoral Division of the Union and that having gone through each the Clerk was directed to make out a copy and submit same today for approval of the Board.

The Chairman stated his views respecting the propriety of making Rates to last for 12 months instead of six, and the Committee recommended the adoption of that course to the Board, they also recommended that an advance of £1500 be taken from the Treasury to defray the current expenses of the Union preceding the making out of the Rate and collecting Books.

Ordered, That a Rate be struck for 12 months as recommended by our Committee and that the Commissioners be requested to sanction our taking the advance of £1500 from the Treasury temporarily on the terms offered by him of 5 per cent until the Rates can be put into course of collection about the middle of July and that the following scale of Rates be agreed upon viz.

That in the case of the Electoral Divisions of Kiltealy and Clohannon where the sums required to meet their present debts and the estimate of their requirements for 12 months exceed 4/- in the Pound, it is the opinion of the Board that a larger Rate than 4/- would be most difficult of collection and injurious to the Ratepayers and as the above sum will more than cover the expenditure estimated for - the sanction of the Local Assessors is requested to allow the reduction to 4/- each on those Divisions for the present Rate in the hope that the prospects of a better state of things may be realized before the end of the year.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

The Guardians of the Union of Ballyvaldon represented that Ballyvaldon was a portion of the old Electoral Division of Mullagh, that at the Change of the Union on the 10th Augt 1850, certain townlands lying in that old Division were transferred to the Union of Gorey, that the Union of Mullagh had a considerable Balance in its favor at that time, that the Mutation of the townlands amounted to the Gorey Union was about £700 and that the proportion of the sum to the Credit of the old Division allocated by the Clerk to the Credit of the townlands aforesaid was £62.4.10, also that certain townlands transferred from the Union of Gorey to the Electoral Division of Ballyvaldon had a very considerable sum to their Credit from that Union at the time of Change.

Agreably to appointment a meeting of the Board of Guardians took place on Friday the 28th May 1852

Present - Master G. J. G. the Clerk  
Other Guardians Messrs. T. Prender, M. Weston  
B. O'Hallerty, G. C. Roberts and J. Bolger.

The Master was called on to make his statement respecting the Riot among the Women on Tuesday last and its cause.

Two adult girls Carr & Gilbert had a dispute at breakfast that morning when Carr threw her tin of milk in Gilbert's face, Carr was immediately removed to the Cell for punishment and confined for 6 hours, about dinner time she was liberated and placed in the Probation Ward her dinner having been sent down to her, there was another female at the time provisionally admitted in the Probation Ward, about half past 6 o'clock Carr continued to get up fire from the Bath Room fire place and set fire to two beds, the Sister being the smoke and getting the small ran up at her and with some help put out the fire and replaced Carr in the Cell, about this time the women were being put to bed into their dormitories from the windows of which they saw what was taking place below and Carr's mother ran down to prevent her daughter being put into the Cell, she seized the Master by the Cravat but the Agricultural Committee & his assistance got her off and secured both herself and her daughter, at this time loud cries were heard in the dormitories from Carr's sisters and their party who raised all the rest into rioting.

The Police were sent for and before they arrived the Master and Assistants who were getting the women to bed were knocked about & down torn off and obliged to run locking the gates of the lobbies after them, the Police not having yet arrived the Clerk, Agricultural and all the Male Assistants heading opened one of the gates ran up to pacify and get them to go to bed, but when they learned the dormitories were assailed by a shower of Clog Soals and had soon to take refuge in the Matron's Room the door of which was attacked and battered considerably with heavy Clog Soals, previous to this the Assistant Master had been sent up among them by the Master and saw about 200 women in a very

repaetory state in the stairs and lobbies trying to break the Gates which were locked, he saw buckets & lids thrown after the Agricultural and Schoolmasters, all the poor men had Clogs in their hands and saw numbers of them thrown, The Police at length arriving went in with fixed Bayonets but could not prevent the yelling and noise, they remained there about 10 o'clock when the repaetory spirit having at length subsided all were locked up for the night, Miss Pounds and Roberts - Guardians were promptly on the spot but did not succeed in quelling the Riot.

On Wednesday Mr. Maher and Mr. Pounds attended in the Board Room and finding that order had been restored and the inmates within work suggested as the most prudent course for Master to make his Report to an adjourned meeting to be held on Friday for that special purpose - in the interim to mark the conduct of the ring leaders and report thereon.

The Master gave in the following list of those who were most prominent in the Riot viz  
1 Mary Kiucella, 2 Anne McDonald, 3 Cathie Britton, 4 Biddy Hogan, 5 Anastasia Byrne Cillary Carr, 7 Cathie McDonald, 8 Cathairn Mallins, 9 Johanna Bolger, 10 Eliza Toole Mary Wood, 12, Eliza Murphy, 13 Anne Deverett, 14 Anna Cleary, 15 Mary Bolton Kilkenny Redmond.

Sergeant Troy deposes that he came with his party of six men about 8 o'clock to the Workhouse, saw the pauper women on the Stair Case and lobbies - that they were shouting and very refractory in their dormitories, went in with great difficulty, heard Anne McDonald and Anastasia Byrne crying out to be let at the Hawkin, that they would stone him to death on the land & the other cried out to be let at the gate, identifying these women and was then requested to retire.

Supt Inspector Strain <sup>12</sup> appeared and produced the information of the Master, Assistant Master, Agricultural & Matron as taken by Mr Barry R.M. who had gone today to Wexford. Carr and her mother were in custody since the attempt to burn the House. The offenders were then severally brought before the Board and examined.

Ordered, That having fully investigated the Riots of the 25th Inst. the following 5 Paupers be fully committed for trial in addition to Eliza Carr and her Mother, Vic Mary Niassella Ann McDonald, Cathie Brittan, Biddy Hogan and Anastasia Byrne, all the others having expressed Contrition and having been cautioned that the least symptom of disorderly conduct by them in future should be visited by the severest punishment the Board can inflict.

The Board soon after adjourned to Thursday the 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1852,


