May I beg to draw the attention of the Board of Guardians to the extreme inconvenience and injury almost say the wrong done to the Poor in the very extensive District of Ecclesiastical by not having more than one Dispensary within its limits — including the Electoral Division of Killcornock and Edcornim — two parts of the latter are fully eight and a half statute miles from the town of Ecclesiastical. I was under the impression that arrangements had been made and sanctioned by the Poor Law Commissioners for having a Dispensary at the Village of Bilgate and another at Killcornock. I know one case (the poor man is now dead) the Guardian for Edcornim knows it well — I saw more than once on a borrowed Donkeys Car in inclement weather — the Maintenance of his Widow and numerous family in the Poor House in which Spec must be thin lot we would more than pay the cost of a room for a Dispensary

The Chairman having taken the word of the Meeting on the last amendment then appeared but one dissenting voice — and he accordingly declared it carried.

Michael Nolan lately an Inmate was called before the Board and stated that he had a son aged 13 or 14 yrs in the Workhouse had been himself placed in the School as a Monitor assisting to teach the boys Catechism & keep order, his son was in the School, saw him get a stroke of a birch switch on the head from the Schoolmaster, who held it by the small end and struck him with the heavy end, the boy complained of the stroke and could not sleep on that side, it was nine months after receiving the stroke when he took him up to Doctor Parfield. I did not complain to the Master, but complained to the Schoolmaster to himself of the treatment he gave his son, the Hospital Nurse told him that the Doctor stated the boy would not be well for 6 months, he died on Sunday last, when the Schoolmaster gave the stroke the boy trembled and the Book fell from his hands, the head was diseased in the part struck, the bone he thought was injured and the boy died the result,

The Schoolmaster being called up stated that he could not recollect to have ever given the boy a stroke nor of having even ~~ever~~ ^{ever} to be ~~a~~ ^{an} ~~stroke~~ a receipt for doing so he being one of the best conducted boys in the School, and that by the Father own statement it is now upwards of 17 months since the occurrence,

Ordered, That the Clerk write to the Constable in charge of the Emigrant Station requesting on part of the Board that he will immediately give intimation to the Coroners in order an Inquest be held.

The Committee appointed on last Board day to receive the Doctor on the post mortem examination of the body of Lucy Jackson who died suddenly on the 7th last met at the Board Room on Friday the 10th. They now report that in consequence of the Master having stated he had received notice from the Constabulary that an Inquest was about



to be held on the body — they declined entering into any enquiry in the matter and gave direction to the Officer not to allow the body to be entered without the direction of the Police.

A Letter was read from the Clerk of the Gorey Union transmitting an Extract from Minutes of Proceedings of the Guardians of that Union on the 9th Inst in reference to the Stock of that Union not having been taken at the time of Charge — the 10th August 1850, and requesting some of the Members of the Enquiry Board to attend to investigate the correctness of the Stock now proposed to be valued,

Mr Dwan Collector appeared before the Board and stated that as a combination existed on the Commons of Blackstairs and the White mountain against payment of the Rates — he applied to the Bench at Clonrock and was instructed to summon each of the defaulters for the whole sum due which appeared from the mode of rating in his book to be quite practicable.

Ordered. The Collector for Killan to proceed by Summons before the Bench at Clonrock to enforce payment of the Rates and Arrears due on the Commons and that Mr Donovan be instructed to attend on that day to assist the Collector before the Magistrate,

Ordered. That James Preston be transferred from the Electoral Division of Ferm to the Union at Large.

The Chairman then signed the Order, after which the Board adjourned to Thursday the 21st October 1850.
