With reference to accommodation for cooking in the Infirmary which is much required, I have to report that I have looked over the place with the Master and fear it will be a difficult and troublesome matter to provide same and would suggest that the Visiting Committee with some other Members be requested to take the subject into consideration and with the assistance of the Doctor and Master some improvement will be effected, with regard to increasing the accommodation for the women I consider that this can be done without any very great inconvenience and at a small cost by taking off part of the Hall leading to the Nurse day room and putting a window in the wall adjoining boys yard where there is an Arch. The Master and I have agreed as to the best place for this by which there will be still but one door leading from the Nurses Shop to the Hall the Master informs me there are at present not a sufficient number of rooms to supply the wants of the House and

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

In reference to the Master's Report, James Leary who had been employed in charge of the flax at the Duffry gate was called before the Board, he stated that he had been engaged for 5 nights and days without sleep and that he was assisted by two paupers Scott and Clear in charge of the flax as it was dried, had done about a ton and a half that the Lantern did not give sufficient light and Scott had placed the candle against the wall that he (Leary) had cautioned him about the risk to which Scott replied that even if it did set fire to the flax he could put it out, Mr Hawkins had been with him a few minutes before and had examined the flax whilst he (Leary) held the candle at the door, about 10 small sheaves had been burned a large quantity already dried was on the adjoining loft and he stood with a shovel keeping the fire away from the door, the flax was burned and all danger over in about a quarter of an hour altho the shed roof over the Kila was still burning and being pulled down, the fire was soon got under, the whole flax burned might be 5 or 6 stone,

The Master stated that he had been under and had only been up at the Kila on Thursday night last, when arranging for drying the flax with Mr Hawkins, had given the best lantern he had in the establishment, it was a close

with two rows of Bulls eye glass in it, the
same had been used the previous year in the
cow sheds,

It appears that on account of the necessary
Caution was the occasion of the fire and the
Agriculturist ought to have had a better
knowledge of the risk and have procured a
proper Lantern or not have allowed the
operation to have been carried on during
night time, it was also improper that one
paid man only was engaged to superintend
the operation both by day and night,

When the Master was there all appeared to
go on safe there were Rice bags spread
under the flax on the kiln to prevent any
danger, the Candle had been brought to
burn by one of the helpers without the lantern
when he went to view it, but only to the kiln
door, under all the circumstances very
little injury has been sustained

Mr Cliffe brought under the Consideration
