Ordinary Business

The Clerk reported, in reference to the Committee's Letter dated 5 January inst. No 78288 that the Fever Hospital at Newtown Barry is the property of the Hon^{ble} Somerset Association, the use of which is allowed to the Guardians free of rent as they are sending patients and maintaining the Hospital out of the Rates under 15th Section 6 & 7 Vic Cap 92. The Emuisthery Fever Hospital is in like manner allowed to be used by the Guardians they maintaining it under the same Act and no rent being charged by the Trustees of the Earl of Portland whose property it is. The Salter's Fever Hospital was originally vested in those Trustees by the subscribers who erected it and has been supported jointly by the Guardians of the Gory and Emuisthery Unions under the 16th Section of the same Act subject to a yearly rent paid in money by each Board, the Guardians of the Gory Union have however given notice of their intention to discontinue sending patients to that Hospital and the whole expenditure appears

likely soon to be borne by the Emancipatory Union should they continue the use of that Hospital in future. All these Hospitals are now supported out of the Rates and not by any Grant or Presentation made by the Grand Jury. That the Weekly Return of Workhouse and Hospital Accommodation and Inmates will in future contain in Col 10 instead of Col 18 the number of Fever and Dysentery Patients relieved in this Union as stated to be more regular.

On this Report the Board postponed making any Order until next Board day.

In reference to the Communication from the Medical Officer of the Fever Hospital at Clontarf as reported on the proceedings of last Board day the Committee of Guardians then appointed reported that

That that Hospital is the property of ^{the} Trustees R. S. Doyle, Rev A. Stephenson and Rev H. B. Farmer and they are the only parties who are to refuse admission to the Patients sent them, should they refuse to admit Patients from the District wherein the subscribers to the Old Dispensary who built the Hospital and Dispensary (now under one roof) lived, — an action at Law would oblige them to sell the Building and divide the proceeds between the Electoral Divisions to which the subscribers on the Books at the closing of the Dispensary belong, the Opinion of the R. L. Commissioners is requested as the Guardians are not willing to discontinue supporting this Hospital, that in the mean time Doctor Cartan be requested to receive the Patients and to furnish

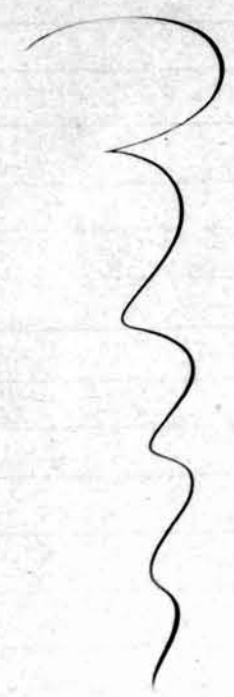

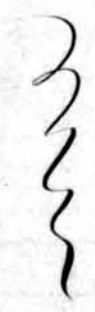

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

Visited the Kitchen, part of the men's hospital. Boys & girls school and Weaver Shop, the general appearance of all these apartments is satisfactory if I except the Kitchen in which there was a great number of women—I counted twelve—the men in Hospital on Hall Diet complain that they do not get as good stewart as usual, they say that latterly it is very thin such as generally given to the women in the Dining Hall. In the yard from the Kitchen to the Hospital, I found two tins in one of which there was some sweetmilk. In the girls school the Embroiders has twenty girls engaged at sewer Muslin and she considers they are going on as well as can be expected, they appear very attentive, the Pies in this school are very weak and do not emit as much heat as might be expected. I think the Master's attention should be called to the pies in all the schools during this season, the Weavers appear to be going on very well and are progressing. I should mention that one of the men in Hospital asked for additional bed clothes.
