Ordinary Business

Agreeably to the Resolution of the Board on the 7th December last a Petition to Parliament was read, adopted and ordered to be signed by the Chairman with part of the Board against the Bagnalstown and Wexford Railway Bill. Now before a Committee of the Town of Leevale and the Petition was directed to be forwarded for presentation to the MacEachern one of the County Members.

A request was made by the Master Weaver that instead of Rations he be allowed their value in Money and to live outside his leaving a family.

Ordered. That in future the wages of Martin Cooley Master Weaver be £28.40 per Ann or $\frac{10}{10}$ pence per week without Rations or Apartment instead of £15 per Ann with both the Value of Rations being £13.4/-

Doctor Clegg's Return as ordered was laid before the Board and read.

The Medical Officer of the Workhouse came before the Board as requested last Board day, and explained that the cause of the increase Consumption of Stimulants was owing to a combination of causes one of which was that many persons were admitted in a very collapsed state and being incapable of using an adequate quantity of other nourishment were obliged to be allowed Stimulants. Another cause was that formerly the Workhouse Infirmary contained few but Workhouse Patients and it has at present a great number from

the entire Union and that many of the latter class are persons completely bent down in Constitution and of course requiring Stimulants. He further stated that having submitted the Whisky to the Officer of Excise to be tested it was found that the Strength was only 102 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent that is only 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent over proof.

Ordered. That the explanation is satisfactory, that the Whisky being in the Infirmary having been reported to be only 102 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent instead of 120 per cent according to Contract, that any work remaining in store or in the Fever Hospital be sealed up and the Contractor notified that his account can only be paid in proportion to the Water delivered (that is) by a deduction of 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent or 18th on the price of all Whisky delivered since the commencement of the Contract.

Ordered. That the Infirmary be provided with an Hydrometer for testing the Whisky should the price not exceed three Guineas, the Clerk to write making Enquiry.

Ordered. In reference to the Minutes of the 17th March directing a "Suspension of late proceedings against the sureties of the late defaulter Collector Edward Nolan until Messrs. Maher and Sonner met" — that the parties concerned will be required by the Arbitrators above named to sign Letter binding themselves to abide by the Award on receipt of which the Arbitrators will appoint a day to consider the matter and if such Letter be not signed by the day next after the same be instructed to proceed as before directed.
