

Considered the House substantially good the Agricultural and Trade department an excellent. the discipline of the boys and the absence of punishment are very striking the only fault found by Mr. George Le Hunt is in the Infirmary wards on the women side - they looked more disorderly than other wards though at first distasteful to aged inmates yet finally their comfort is very much dependent upon order and cleanliness. Mr. Grant Le Hunt would add to the above that having visited the Fever Hospital connected with the House very strongly recommends that no patients be put into the sheds until the Hospital itself is full. the sheds were in his opinion quite unfit for use except in case of the main room being ever crowded. a floor of which should be appropriated to each sex. the Fever Hospital may be much improved.
