### Ordinary Proceedings

A Letter was read from the Registrar General requesting the co-operation of the Guardians in facilitating the labours of the Enumerators when collecting information on the extent of tillage and the number of live stock in the several Electoral Divisions of the Union.

A Letter was read from Mr. Roberts stating that he was requested by Mr. Ellis to inform the Board that if they arrange with the persons whose land is between the Workhouse and the Fever Hospital he will allow the Tenants for so much of the land as the proposed passage will occupy and be happy to grant the right of passage at will to the Guardians.

A Letter was read from the Clerk of Ballinacorney Union stating that the Fever Hospital on the Workhouse ground in that Union is capable of accommodating 60 Patients and that its erection cost £925 being 2 stories high.

The Board then adjourned for an hour for the purpose of inspecting the Workhouse Buildings with the view of appropriating a portion thereof for the use of a Fever Hospital and having returned to the Board Room made the following Order.

That the North wing of the Workhouse Buildings now used as a Boys School House is well suited for a Fever Hospital, with some slight additions such as a Commalescent Yard and Wash House — the Medical Officers opinion is also in favor of the appropriation of that Building for the use of Fever Patients — as it can be easily detached from all communication with the other Buildings and we have therefore to request the sanction of the Poor Law Commissioners for making the necessary alterations for the purpose of a Fever Hospital on the Workhouse ground, by which it will save the Union of a very large outlay.

Ordered. That the Clerk withdraw the Advertisements from the Newspapers respecting the erection of a Fever Hospital until further orders.
