Mr. Hymot gave notice of moving next Board day, that Dorah Little be discharged from the Division of Ballyhuskard, and admitted on the Union at Large.

Mr. P. Whelan moved that a statement, regarding the Pauper Margaret Cleary, be forwarded to the Poor Law Commissioners, for their opinion.

Ordered, that the Master be desired to obtain tenders for enclosing the pipes connected with the Pump and Cistern, in some description of cases.

The Clerk was ordered to write to the Contractor for the works doing at the Jail of Wexford, stating to him that a person named Copeland who is in his

employment there and whose family are now in this Workhouse must attend on Friday, next to explain to this Board why he has absented himself from this Workhouse having only obtained leave for one day and that if he fails to do so his family will not be retained in this Workhouse.

The Clerk was directed to write to the Poor Law Commissioners, stating that the Guardians feel that they stand in great need of Mr. Muggenidge or some competent person being sent by them, P. L. Commissioners, to give instructions and advice generally, with regard to the management of this Institution. A cheque for £3 for Petty Cash was given to the Clerk.

He was also directed to get printed for each division of this Union, 100 handbills, such as the copy furnished by the Board stating the change made by the late act, with regard to the Residence of Paupers. The Clerk was directed to write to all the Collectors, to attend here on the 27th inst., with such sums as they shall have collected in the mean time, when the Board will decide whether sufficient exertions have been made by the Collectors, and the Board will proceed against the sureties, where it shall appear, that such sufficient exertions have not been used.

Mr. Farmer gave notice, that on the 27th inst. he would move, that the general rate of 7½^d be proportioned on each of the Electoral Divisions of this Union, according to the expenditure of such divisions respectively for the last six months, and the Clerk is hereby directed to make out the proportions accordingly.

The Matron asked leave to get some repairs done at spinning wheels, to get 1 stone of Wool carded, 2 Pieces of linen wove, which were all ordered to be done. She put in her bill of half year's salary due 29th Sept^r amounting to £12.10.0 but in consequence of the state of the funds a cheque for £6 only was given her.

The Master asked for 2 shovels 2 forks and leave ~~and leave~~ to get repaired a lock on door of Women's day room and one Tray ~~and~~ an order for 4yds of shroudling, also a coffin for deceased Pauper Mr. Brien & 1 quire of writing paper which were severally ordered.
