Ordinary Proceedings

A Letter was read from the Secretaries of the Statistical Board of Education, enclosing Receipts to be filled up for Grantmaster of £100.0.0 allotted to the Agricultural and £200.0.0 to the Schoolmaster for half year ending 30 June last.

In reference to the Master's report on the Cemetery, the Porter was called before the Board and examined. He stated he had been to visit the Cemetery at the burial of a woman on the 22nd December last, there being no interment there since — and on that occasion had the coffin placed 3 feet under the surface to the feet of his judgment. Saw the defect in the grave as reported by the Master for the first time on Sunday last having gone there with the party that day. — had not been present when that grave was filled.

Ordered that the Master shall see that the grave in question be recovered with at least 2 feet of clay and well packed. That Sanders be accepted for making drains 4 feet deep and not with 2 inch pipes till the draining to be 30 feet adunder. In future the graves to be opened 4 feet deep and not to contain more than 3 coffins, and have 3 feet of cover to the surface. The graves to be completed each week. — The Brown Gate to be secured by New Hinges and an Iron Pin & Stock lock. That the Porter of this Chapel and the Porter of the King's Hospital be most particular in carrying out the above instructions.

Mr. M. Still brought forward the matter of which he gave notice for the removal of Patrick Spenshaw and family from the Division of Lonsdale to Dalkey. Upon investigation it was found that he had resided in the Lonsdale Division for the longest period within the last 3 years, and that therefore no alteration could be made in the chargeability which was ordered to remain as it is.

Gravestone for Coffins were opened and read, but being considered too high in price the Clerk was directed to purchase by parcels.
