The Schoolmaster applied for leave of absence to attend an examination at Wexford on the 10th to which he had been summoned by the District Inspector - He applied also to be allowed to absent himself on Monday the 12th in order to visit the School at Ballymore to which he had been recently appointed - that he should return on Tuesday morning the 13th and remain until the new Schoolmaster to be appointed shall take charge

Ordered Leave granted - the Schoolmaster to be employed on the Farm during the Schoolmaster's absence.



The small complaint of was from a Patient named Spence who has got a Chronic Bowel Complaint and a running sore on his Hip from an old gun shot wound - this man is not likely to recover and consequently whilst he remains - the smell from

The pore must vent more or less - we need when Fever Patients are in profusion it is not right or prudent to permit a Current of air upon them - As regards the statement made by the Porter Thomas (St. Cranfield) had already explained to the Dispensary Committee - In reference to the Dog he did not belong to him but to his brother officer of the same Dispensary who had him removed on several occasions but the Dog was in the habit of returning to the Fever Hospital - and on the last occasion the night before (after Hamiltons visit the dog was fired at and wounded in making his way to the Hospital Grounds - that I know of or willingly he never allowed a portion of food belonging to the Union to be given to the Dog and to the best of his belief he never receives food belonging to the Union which can be certified on oath by the man if necessary.
