The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

Masters Report

Visited and inspected the Ocular Fever Hospital on Saturday last and begged to state that as the guardians have now obtained a lease of the Hospital it is essentially necessary to have the following repairs and work executed on that Establishment in order to keep the building standing viz

The two chimneys require to be taken down and rebuilt as they have given way and are in a dangerous state, the roof and weather slating require repairs, and the wooden saddle on the Hip require repairs and painting; the stone steps at the Hall door to be taken down and reset, the Doors, Windows and stair case to be repaired and painted with two coats of good drab colour and white paint, the windows all require glazing; there is a new

sash wanted for the window of the Stone-room and a new panel over the Hall door, the entire building requires to be white washed and the ground floor to be made new or repaired, the doors of the Straw House, Dead House and Priory required to be repaired with locks, hinges &c, and the roof to be tiled, The Doctor has very cheerfully offered to give all the Lime and sand required to carry out the above and the use of scaffold poles and ladders he would strongly recommend that the floors be laid with 9 by 12 in tiles which would be of some duration, for if made with clay or lime as heretofore it will be as bad as ever in one year With reference to the reply received from the Governor of Carlisle Lunatic Asylum relative to the female Lunatics Spink and Teale, he begged to state that he had forwarded the necessary forms of admission to the Asylum on the 3rd December last and would respectfully refer the Guardians to his report of that date and to his reports of the 10th December and 4th February last relative to said parties and forms. He had further to state that he had received a reply from the Governor acknowledging the receipt of those forms.

A Lunatic named Bridget Moore who was sent home from the Carlisle Asylum last July as cured has again become violent, he had her brought before the Magistrate yesterday and committed to Wexford Jail on the ground of being a dangerous Lunatic.

The Matron returned on Sunday evening last and resumed her duties.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:—

Mr Luke Byrne of Cronogue proposes to take out a boy named William Saunders and give him 10/- a quarter provided he gets clothing. Saunders was admitted to the Workhouse, 6th February 1850 then 8 years old and chargeable on Ballinacorney Division.

Ordinary Proceedings

The usual admission of paupers took place and all those in the Relieving officers Books were admitted to relief in the Workhouse or Fever Hospital of the Union.

Ordered. That Richard Shallow and wife both now residing in the Workhouse, be discharged from the Workhouse, employment being now easily obtained for that class.

The Clerk submitted the Estimate of Rates for the ensuing Year and was directed to summon a Special Meeting to consider it on Wednesday next the 7th inst, also to summon the Collectors to attend with their Books for examination same day.

The Chairman Solicitor attended and read a letter from his Dublin Correspondents Mess^{rs} Elliott from which it appeared that the decision of the Commissioners of Incumbered Estates Court has been affirmed by the Privy Council in the case of O'Connell and O'Brien whereby a Civil Bill decree registered as a Judgment in the Superior Courts under the 12th and 13th Vic Cap 104 sections 7 and 18 is not allowed any priority over charges on the Estate of defaulting Landlords but must take its place from its date, and this decision will affect the case of the Guardians against Colclough for the arrears due to the Townland of Coolcarney similarly circumstanced in that Court.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Meeting of the Board)

The Solicitor being present the Guardians submitted to him the question of payment of Co Cess charged on the Workhouse Farm and the letter to the Commissioners of the 23rd September last read. He advised that the nature of the Title to the different holdings should be submitted to the Commissioners to see whether or not they think such Farms come under the Statute for exemption from County Cess Half of same being valued and rated on the Landlord.

Applications for the situation of Schoolmistress and their Testimonials were opened and read, only Ten the Board selected four who were in attendance, Miss Graham, Miss Fitzpatrick, Miss Carroll and Miss Rose Carolan. They were severally called before the Board and examined and their answering generally was excellent, on a scrutiny the number was reduced to two between whom the voting appeared to be

The Commissioners for administering the Law for Relief of the Poor in Ireland have had before them the Reports of their Inspector Mr McNaughton and the evidence taken on the Inquiries recently held

by him with a view to ascertain the Circumstances under which the dog that was discovered by him on the Fever Hospital premises at Elminstree was placed there and the arrangements that existed for the care and feeding of the animal.

The evidence adduced at the first Inquiry held on the 8th Instant not being satisfactory as regards the ownership of the dog; James Doyle the Porter of the Fever Hospital and Dispensary having sworn that he did not know to whom the dog belonged but that the person who first brought the dog to the Hospital stated that Dr Craufield sent it there, and Dr Craufield having as the Commissioners have been informed by Mr Hamilton — enquired by what authority the Commissioners had introduced his name into the letter to the Guardians in connection with the dog: it became necessary to reopen the Inquiry in order to obtain further evidence on the point and to ascertain the instructions (if any) that were given to the officers of the Workhouse at the time the dog was placed in their charge and with this view the Commissioners suggested to Mr Hamilton the propriety of examining Dr Craufield and also Dr Goodisson the Medical Officer of the Fever Hospital. Accordingly on the further Inquiry held by Mr Hamilton in pursuance of the Commissioners instructions on the 22nd instant Dr Craufield was examined when he stated that he had no recollection as to the person who brought the dog to the Hospital but that the animal belonged to him at the time (about the middle of Feb. 1857) and that he gave it away about 13 months ago. Dr Goodisson also deposed to the ownership of the dog when he first saw it —

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

at the Hospital — that it belonged to Dr Craufield, that he had frequently hunted it away from the Hospital and that he cautioned Mrs Slye the Hospital Nurse not to give it any of the food of the patients, and he is satisfied she did not give it any of the patients food, that he does not know who brought the dog to the Hospital nor what instructions were given in reference to its feeding.

Mrs Slye deposed that she got no instructions at the time the dog came to the Fever Hospital from any person as to his care and maintenance, that she does not recollect having seen any person bringing the dog to the Hospital and she never had any conversation with Dr Craufield about him, but the Porter of the Fever Hospital and Dispensary deposes that he had found out since the previous Inquiry that Michael Murphy who lived at Doctor Craufield's was the person who brought the dog to the Hospital and that Murphy said to Mrs Slye at the door that Dr Craufield had sent the dog but gave no instructions as to its care and maintenance, that he never had any conversation with Dr Craufield about the keeping of the dog.

It further appears from the Evidence of Doyle and is admitted by Dr Craufield that there was at the same time a second dog also the property of Doctor Craufield kept for a short period at the Hospital; Doyle says for a few days and Dr Craufield says for one day.

Michael Murphy deposed that he was sent by Dr Craufield to the Fever Hospital with the first mentioned dog while a Puppy a few days after Dr Craufield got possession of it, that Dr Craufield told him to leave the dog at the Hospital but gave him no further instructions,

It is clear from the Evidence adduced on the second Inquiring as above admitted to that the dog at the time he was sent to the Hospital and for ~~four~~ ^{four} months afterwards was the property of Dr Craufield and that it was by his directions he was placed in the Hospital.

As regards the feeding of the dog during the time he was in the Hospital Mrs Slye deposed that he got food from herself and her assistants occasionally but did not get any of the food provided for the Patients, and Mary Purcell one of the Assistant Nurses deposed that the Nurses used occasionally to throw the dog a crust belonging to themselves and that if she were washing a Tin she would give him ~~the~~ the leavings.

The Commissioners consider that it has been clearly established that the dog in question was supported in the Fever Hospital from the time he was placed there by Dr Craufield in the month of February 1857 down to the time he was dismissed by Mr Hamilton embracing a period of about 14 months and that a most

improper abuse of his Authority and ^{position} ~~position~~ both as a Medical Officer of the Union and a member of the Board of Guardians has been committed by ~~him~~ Doctor Craufield.
