Ordinary Proceedings.

The Board proceeded with the consideration of applications for relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union during which the ordinary class of cases presented itself.

Mr. & Mrs. Mill of Craan appeared before the Board as requested in last Board day respecting the girl Mary Byrne aged 16 years who had been taken out by them to service last harvest but who left her service and made application for admission

to the Workhouse on the 22nd Ult^o. the girl was also brought before the Board. Mr. Mill stated that she had left him and went to her aunt for several weeks that she was very fond of her own way - that she left off picking potatoes on one occasion and went out of the field altogether saying that work was too hard for her. - that if she had remained in his service he would no doubt have kept her and paid according to agreement and that even now if she returned and does her work willingly as directed he will take her. - she was then asked if she would consent to return and having done so she was directed to be discharged from the Workhouse tomorrow.

Mr. James Pomer came before the Board and claimed payment for a sample of wool which had not been included in his account, and upon consideration payment was ordered for 9 lbs at 1/11.

Ordered. That the Relieving Officer write to the Governor of Newfod Gaol to ascertain the Religious Denomination of the mother of the girl Budget Byrne alias Nolan with a view to the proper registration of the child now in the Workhouse under that heading.

A Circular Letter was read from the Board of Education addressed to Managers of National Schools in reference to the service of Notice by a new Teacher on the parents of children of a different religious denomination from his own notwithstanding that his predecessor may have also done so. Another Circular under same date (30th Nov^{ber} last) setting forth that Managers can be

supplied with Harmoniums at reduced rates,

A Letter was read from the Commis-
-sioner of Valuation dated 2nd Inst notifying
that Mr John Furmar has been appointed
to carry out the annual Revision of Valuation
of this Union for the present year and re-
-questing that he may be assisted by any
-information that can be given by the Col-
-lectors respecting Tenements requiring revision.

The Board considered in what amount
they would effect Insurance with the
Sinn Office and finally resolved to insure
in the sum of £2100 - the premium on
which amounted to a sum of £8 - as per
Schedule agreed to and a Cheque for that
amount was drawn and the Clerk directed
to pay the Agent before Monday next.

A Letter was read from the School-
-master stating that in consequence of his
having accepted the Office of Teacher
in a National School - he has to give
notice of resignation in one month.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

Masters Report

He attended the Petty Sessions on Monday last with the Nation - the Tailor and four of the inmates for the purpose of prosecuting David & Mary Culbert (late inmates of the Workhouse) for feloniously taking or having in their possession stolen goods the property of the Guardians of this Union. It appears that Culbert whilst in the House induced a boy named Patrick Doyle (who was employed in the Tailors Shop) to convey the materials to him which he (Doyle) did on two or three different occasions to the extent of about 3 yards of Drize at 4/6 a yard value 12/-, He also conveyed leather to him amounting to about four or five pair of soles and three or four pair of uppers. He had taken stock of the leather and found 2 lbs of Butt and 5 lbs of Slitter deficient value about 4/6. The Leather was taken during Daniel Laffors holding his situation and the Drize since Edward Laffors was appointed Shoemaker. It appeared that

Doyle placed three articles round his body under his clothes and when let out by the Master Tailor conveyed them to Cullbert in the Dormitory at night who carried them away next morning in some manner and hid them on the Farm until an opportunity offered to dispose of them. There was also a shift the property of the Guardians found on the person of Mary Cullbert. Great merit is due to Constable John Blackwell for his vigilance and indefatigable exertions on the occasion, - on receiving private information he at once hastened to me for a sample of the Dress used in the House and after comparing it with the trousers in the Pains Office proceeded to Mary Brims well known lodging house for the purpose of arresting the suspected parties but found they had decamped. He pursued them accompanied by Sub Constable Thomas Reilly and ran to Oulgate a distance of about 5 miles in 30 minutes where they came up with Cullbert and his wife - arrested and brought them before the Magistrate on Monday last who committed them for trial at the ensuing assizes.

The Master trusted that the gentlemen of the Board will remember Constable Blackwell should an opportunity offer in the way of promotion, as also Sub Constable Thomas Reilly.

A Lunatic named Alice Mernagh admitted provisionally on the ^{the} ~~the~~ ^{Journal's} Report is still in a very deranged state.

Ordered, The Tailor and Shoemaker have undergone a long examination before the Board which from their character has not been satisfactory. The Clerk to write to the Governor of Carlisle Lunatic Asylum enquiring if he can make room for Alice Mernagh.

In the female school the children were comfortably clad with the exception of two who had not shoes or stockings, one of them was a case of deformed foot - the child not long in the Workhouse would not wear the shoes - the other seemed a case of neglect she had been a fortnight from the Infirmary. The excuse was want of shoes to fit. The health of the children good. I think the number at present (35) could be more comfortably accommodated in the infant schoolroom. The window in dayroom requested to have the windows more opened for ventilation which was done. ^{The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others, were read by the Clerk and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or, Orders made on them respectively as follows):—} had been furnished under four hours. I think a great quantity of work might be done by this class without requiring too much from the inmates. The Infirmary was in excellent order as well as the Sanatic Wards altho there were two troublesome cases on the female side. It is truly a melancholy sight to see so many cases a great many of which could no doubt be relieved by proper medical treatment in an Asylum. The boys were going from the Dining Hall to school and appeared healthy & sufficiently well clad. I am sorry to have had reported to me that some robbery of materials from the Shoemaker & Tailor's Shop had taken place and that an organised system of plunder had begun but fortunattly was soon discovered. I recommend that the master be allowed a Smith for a day or so to convert some old Iron bedsteads into a fence for the flower ground at the passage from the Dining Hall to the School yards at either side also that he shall have the Shed over the Pump House painted as soon as the weather will permit.
