



Agreeably to notice W. Carroll brought forward the Resolutions which had been patterned from the 29th 21st and having after considerable explanation proposed the following they were unanimously adopted by the Board. The Clerk to send a copy to the Commissioner of Valuation.

Resolved, That we view with alarm the backward tendency of our agricultural system that is - if the agricultural statistics of the Registrar General be trustworthy data to judge by, showing a loss in our Cereal and leguminous crops of a sum of nearly 67 million Pounds sterling in twelve years - a loss of over 12 million in our green crops notwithstanding the vast sums paid for food for our stock and of artificial manures and costly seeds to grow our crops besides showing a loss of nearly 23 millions by the emigration of our small farmers and laborers in one year: - in a word showing us to be now over 100 millions poorer than we were during the years of famine when political Economists told us we had a redundant population whilst we believe that so far from that we all now know to a certainty what many of us before but suspected that we never had any such redundancy of labour but on the contrary too few skilled labourers if properly directed to develop the vast resources of our fertile but much neglected country.

Resolved, That we view with surprise the recommendations of influential writers and Statesmen of high standing in the political world for the improvement of our social system - that is - by the enlargement of farms and abandonment of tillage which we now know by sad experience to have been some of the chief causes of our agricultural retrogression and a considerable cause of weakness to the British Empire.

Resolved, That we view with deep disapprobation the authority cited by the Registrar General in a late report laid before the House of Commons as not only justifying the course which has led to our losses but recommending its further adoption to a most ruinous degree.

Resolved, That whilst we admire the energy displayed by the Registrar General in collecting & arranging his agricultural statistics - we disapprove of the forms in which he publishes them and the advice which accompanied them as calculated to mislead the unwary Statesman - Landed Proprietor and Farmer as well as the Mercantile & Commercial Gentleman interested in Ireland's prosperity and England's strength - and we respectfully call on the Registrar General to amend his forms with the view of giving to the public a correct idea of our resources.

Resolved, That having from the commencement afforded to the Registrar General the best aid in our power when such aid had been refused, to his colleagues in England & Scotland by men hitherto supposed by some to be more enlightened than we were - our claim to be heard in this our demand is not only legitimate - but is imperative on us to make as Irish Landlords, Irish Farmers & Irish Traders whose sole dependence is on the agricultural improvement of Ireland and whose interest and anxious desire it is to uphold and increase the strength of the United Kingdom but more particularly that of our own country.

Resolved, That acting on these impressions we shall on our parts leave nothing undone to develop our industrial resources and that we conceive it to be the duty of the Registrar General to afford us all the aid he can command or obtain giving us not only correct Statistics but Statistical reports accompanied by sound practical advice drawn from the most reliable and unquestionable sources — also that his Statistical reports be more extensively circulated especially amongst the Poor Law Guardians of Ireland who are the men best calculated to aid him in the best possible manner.

Resolved, That viewing the disorganised state of the Continent of Europe & America we feel it to be our imperative duty to increase the food producing powers of Ireland and thereby as far as possible arrest the vast drain on our slender resources in the purchase of food for our people and farm stock and to do all in our power to stem the torrent of emigration which deprives us of our greatest wealth namely skilled Labourers whilst we have left

In a word we look upon the proper training and judicious employment of the pauper boys of this Union even quite independent of the moral & social effect on the boys themselves.

Resolved, that whilst We thus bear willing testimony to the good effects of such training We do not look upon it as by any means as perfect as what it should and We hope will still be by a further improvement in the system which can be effected were we in a position to afford distinctive marks for merit to the more deserving boys somewhat on the same principles adopted by the directors of Reformatories.

Resolved, That the undersigned the Board of Education to afford us all the aid in their power to enable us the better to carry out the system of agricultural training and that We also memorialise the Poor Law Commissioners for any

further aid they can afford us if any, or at least to avoid imposing on us any unnecessary restrictions which by any authority under the Poor Law Acts they might arbitrarily impose.
