 The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 834 to No. 954, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.  
 The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 4698 to No. 4725, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.  
 The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:

The Clerk's Report of Vaccination was read - (this on the first meeting in every month.) Number of successful cases.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

Orders were signed and countersigned for the following viz. 1 lb Wafers. 1 Coal Kiddle. 2 lbs Hemp & sweeping brushes - 1 pair scissors. 1 stone paint. 5 Gals Lamp oil. 5 pullies for lamp & yds wire. for do. 4 lbs tip nail, 100-3' nails. 1 Stone 1/2 lb Wm Housewife thread. 2 Hides heavy kip. 1000 spec nails. 2 doz first book of Lessons. Bottoming 5 Clothes baskets. 24 doz Brooms, 1 pair scissors.

The visiting committee reported, that having visited the Irish street store, and desired the Master to get beds ready - he prepared to do so. the original <sup>building</sup> is now filling fast & all the available out room must be got into immediate readiness for any unexpected pressure, the boys are to go to sleep at Duffry street the ensuing week, found the Tom-pleshannon ward as usual, suggested that the old men be sent there, that cotton wool could be manufactured there with advantage, that two looms could be put up and the woollen <sup>The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:</sup> linen cloth spun in the House be wove there - recommended the south (or women's side) gate to be kept locked almost continually, that the straw in that yard be altered & a House built for the purpose in the men's yard many thefts being the result of the gate (at the women's side) having to be so frequently opened taking in straw - recommended the Master or assistant to be in the kitchen when the dinner is sending in to the dining Hall, got a return from the ward-mistress of the coals used at Tom-pleshannon since the 9<sup>th</sup> November.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

The Medical officer produced to the Board at about 3 o'clock P.M. the Meat sent over to the Stemplehannon Ward for the Infirm there — there were 16 Rations ordered that day  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb each, this quantity being given only 3 times in the week. He showed to the satisfaction of the Board that from the crag & tail of clutton — the bones & refuse sent over by the Matron — it would be difficult if not impossible to obtain one pound of Meat say 4 Rations fit for use by the Infirm.

In justice to the contractor the Medical Officer praised the Meat furnished to the officers of the House.

The Board ordered a lock up Basket to be made for the exclusive use of the Infirmary and its own meat to come up

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

separate.

The Master reported that the condemnation of the present straw store by the visiting Committee was very desirable, and that by a very small expence that and the coal store could be converted into two spacious dormitories the size of the mens & womens day rooms.

That he would require from 8 to 15 Gallons of sweetmilk daily more than the quantity contracted for.

The Clerk was directed to issue advertisements for tenders to supply the additional quantity of sweetmilk until 1<sup>st</sup> May 49.

A Letter was read from the P.L. Commissioners dated 14<sup>th</sup> December 1848, no 66061, directing to their Circular of 7<sup>th</sup> August recommending the collectors to be bound to complete their collection in a limited time, & regretting the Guardians did not adopt that recommendation. They now called on the Board to take steps to ensure the prompt collection of the rate and that if

proper exertions be not made they will dismiss the present collectors under seal with the view of collectors being appointed who will undertake the duties under a limited Board.

The Clerk was ordered to read this letter to the collectors. Another from same dated 15<sup>th</sup> December 1848 no 65692 — with reference to minutes of the Board of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Inst. on which it was resolved that the names of occupiers of holdings under £4 for which Immediate Lessors are rated shall be entered in the Rate & collecting books — stating that there was no objection to the names being entered in the latter books but they cannot be entered in the Rate books under the head of "persons on whom the rate is made."

They at same time request an explanation respecting the payment of Doctor Stook as Medical officer of the Blansroche Temporary Fever Hospital the sum of £16.7 — and in reference to the acceptance by the Committee of the Temp<sup>l</sup> Fever Hospital at Enniscorthy of the Tender of Thomas Martin for meat for 12 mos at  $\frac{2}{4}$  per lb, they considered that under the circumstances it was desirable that fresh tenders be advertised for and that the terms of the advertisements should not be departed from without allowing parties interested an equal opportunity of amending their tenders.

One from the Central Board of Health dated 14<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 48, no 15380, enclosing copy of a letter from Doctor Harvey

An order was read bearing date the 7<sup>th</sup> December 1848— under signature of the Commissioners of Health— addressed to the Board of Guardians, containing rules & regulations for the guidance of the committee of Health appointed by the Board to carry out the "Nuisances removal and Diseases Prevention Act."

The Master received from the Temporary Fever Hospital at Clonroach the following.

and the proceeds of the sale of small articles there amounting to £1.0.1 were lodged in the Treasurers hands to the credit of the Union.

The Clerk was ordered to furnish a list of all contracts and the dates on which same will terminate.

The Master was directed to keep the gate at the womens yard locked — and that same should not be opened but by himself.

The Clerk was directed to apply to the sun Insurance Company — to know if they will supply a Fire engine for the use of the Town the Board providing a House for its reception.

He was also directed to apply to manufacturers in Dublin, Liverpool & Glasgow to ascertain the prices at which an engine suitable for a Workhouse would be supplied.

Next Meeting of the Guardians to be held on Wednesday the 20<sup>th</sup> day of December 1848.

Resolved, that in accordance with directions from the Board of Health the Guardians of this Union will henceforth feel it their duty to direct proceedings under the 11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> vic cap 123, against all persons who permit any description of nuisance to remain in or near their premises, in streets—lanes—sewers &c. and that notices setting forth the same in a full and clear manner be printed & posted as soon as possible.

The Clerk was directed to issue advertisements for Bengal stripe, Bed rugs, Blea calico, Linnen 7<sup>th</sup> — Blankets &c. Leather & other articles. Tenders to be considered this day week.

The attention of the Matron was directed to the necessity of using every exertion to have all the Linnen required for the House spun & manufactured on the premises.

A check for £7.12.5 was handed in from the Treasurer of the Temporary Fever Hospital at Clonroach <sup>the sum having been paid</sup> in favour of the Union Treasurer, which was ordered to be handed to him by the Clerk to be placed to the credit of the Union.

The Committee of the Temporary Fever Hospital were directed to readvertise for tenders for meat.

With reference to the letter of the P.L. Commissioners relative to the payment of £16.4 to Doctor Stock of Clonroach, the Board ordered payment of that account altho at 5<sup>th</sup> per day on the grounds that the Temp<sup>l</sup> Fever Hospital there had closed and for the reasons stated in their resolution of the 4<sup>th</sup> Inst in reference to the question of the salaries of the Medical Officers of the Temp<sup>l</sup> Fever Hospitals of the Union page 6 and that the account of Doctor Harvey of Oulart was not paid the day he presented it for the reasons stated in the resolution referred to.

The time for considering the tenders for Leather was extended to Saturday next of which the Clerk was directed to give notice to parties likely to put in tenders.

In reference to the meat produced to the Board by the Medical Officer, the Master explained that the meat

was supplied to the Infirm as it came from the contractor, that the officers meat and that for <sup>the</sup> sick came separate, the officers on Saturdays only and that for the sick - daily - that he was himself attending his duty at the Board, that in his absence the Matron received the meat and sent that portion over to Templeshannon of which the Medical Officer now complained, that he had heard no complaints of the meat sent over for the sick until now and that as it came separate in the hospital basket he was of opinion the contractor alone was responsible and therefore respectfully repudiated being liable to any imputation which might be drawn from the contract between the meat for officers and that for the Infirm.

The Chairman then signed the cheques recommended by the Finance Committee and the Board adjourned to Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> December 1848.

502 A note was read from Mr. Maher who was prevented attending by particular business recommending that a Cow now in possession of the Board be killed and Soup made for dinner on Christmas day. On consideration the Board agreed to the proposal. He also recommended the purchase of the six acres of ground from Doctor Cranfield on which the Adult Boys and able bodied Men could with great advantage be set to work. The Board ordered the subject to be taken into consideration on Saturday the 30<sup>th</sup> Inst. and the Clerk to give notice of same to the Guardians.

The Chairman then signed the orders and cheques and the Board adjourned to Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1848.

The Visiting Committee reported. That they had visited the Templehannon Ward and found every thing in good order. would recommend instead of sending the infirm men there that the adult men be removed. and that ward solely appropriated for the reception of females.

Visited the original building and found everything very correct. the inmates of all classes well employed. The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows: the Master stated that from the late pressure - he could not get sufficient Linsey made in the house to supply the increased want. found that the door into the mens yard from the dining hall was open and represented it to the Master to have the Officer who was guilty of this neglect brought before the Board. Recommended an Iron railing to be put up in the Kitchen to keep out those who are not appointed as servants there. and recommended the appointment of a paid Laundry mistress. as the Matron is latterly from illness inadequate to superintend that department efficiently.

The Master reported that the practice of burning tins at the womens side has become so intolerable. He inspected those wards on the 28th twice to

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

ascertain the guilty parties, but could get no information from the Wardenmistress appointed there by the Matron. He recommended that she be brought up and suggested that she be dismissed from the House she being able-bodied and single.

The Board upon investigation ordered he dismissal. He reported having found a bundle of House clothing containing several valuable articles - and produced them to the Board, having been discovered thrown over the Infirmary wall early on Sunday morning that he traced them to one of the Infirmary wards and believed the nurses in charge there were cognisant of them.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:

plunder, which he requested the Board would investigate that he had given strict orders to the Head nurse not to allow any of the clothing to remain after night in the Hospital yards, yet found on this occasion they were not brought to the Laundry stores in proper time. He ever found clothes scattered about in the Infirmary yards late at night since.

That the inside garments of the females and children are not regularly changed which the Matron stated to him was caused by a want of Linnen. That the Matron was confined from illness the last week and that he required the Schoolmistress to assist in discharging her duties as well as her own.

He recommended that a House capable of accommodating from 100 to 120 men be hired in order to keep up indoor accommodation. - 672 b. Hurlong Denis was found dead in his bed in the Infirmary Ward on Thursday morning last. It appeared he had been in as good health as usual the night before, but he was a very old man.

The Medical Officer reported that he felt it his duty to denounce the present practice of the House as to the change of Linnen. He found that in several instances a fortnight or more passed without a change the smell emanating from some of the inmates is disgusting in the extreme and that pestilential disease may be expected to be the consequence. He called on the Board to order an immediate remedy for evil.

The Board having hitherto depended for a sufficient supply of Linnen upon that manufactured from the House labour, but now finding that a necessity existed for an immediate supply to remedy the evil complained of - ordered 600 yds of Linnen to be purchased at once.

Upon the production and examination of the Weekly Balance sheets of the several Collectors it was found that Thomas Hinsella was performing his duties very inefficiently and the Board requested the attention of the Commissioners would be again drawn to his case.

Orders. That the appointment of a female superintendent of work & as an assistant to the Matron be taken into consideration on next Saturday.

Mr Maher brought forward the consideration of the purchase of the piece of land in the rear of the Workhouse for which the permission of the Commissioners was already given. It was

Pounder were appointed to visit the Shoemakers' workshop and to report the number of shoes made up since this day week, after returning they reported that six boys had made 20 pair but that they have ascertained there will be in future 7 boys at work and that they will be capable of making 37 pair per week in future.

The Master having brought a complaint that clothing were discovered in a bundle lying outside the Infirmary wall — the Hospital nurse was brought before the Board also the Wardswoman in charge of one of the rooms there.

On investigation it was found that altho the fact of the removing and conveying over the wall could not be fully established against this Wardswoman — very great irregularities existed thro the means and connivance of the staff of Wardswomen at present there and the Board ordered that they be all discharged and other Wardswomen appointed to act in their place by the Master.

Patrick Kavanagh an able-bodied pauper was brought before the Board by Mr Wallace who stated he could obtain work outside, — but the pauper being temporarily on the infirm list the Board ordered that when he is perfectly recovered he shall be discharged from the Workhouse.

Paupers Brophy and Walsh were also brought up by Mr Wallace who stated they could get work employment outside and the Board ordered that he be discharged on Tuesday next.

The Board ordered that the whole stock of Clothing Provisions &c be taken at the beginning of the New Year and for that purpose directed that Mr Wilkison who assisted the taking of stock last time be now engaged and that in taking the stock of Clothing each

Articles be stamped with a separate Number.

The attention of the Treasurer of Oulart Fever Hosp. is requested to be drawn to the necessity of producing a regular Account Current for each Month. shewing the Balances to be carried Forward to the succeeding Month and that the several disbursements be accompanied by their respective receipts that it is not competent for the Board to order payment unless this regulation be complied with —

Mr Lett gave notice that he will move on Saturday the 13<sup>th</sup> Inst. for a new valuation of the Union. In consequence of the numerous complaints of excessive valuation and other existing irregularities in the present valuation of the Union.

A Notice of appeal against the valuation and Rate as placed on No 829. the Templehaugh Electoral Division was put in by Mr Wallace. upon the reading of which the Board directed their valuator to attend the Wexford quarter sessions in support of the valuation on the 10<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>y</sup> next.

The Medical Officer appeared before the Board and made the following report.

In discharging all the experienced Nurses from an Hospital with 1414 Inmates your Board has taken a step which involves the certain loss of lives.

Our Hospital Nurse has not rested since 5 O'clock yesterday morning and it is not possible she could attend Night and day until the new hands can be entrusted with the lives of patients. I believe several of the discharged Nurses to be strictly honest and it was almost physically impossible that some of them could have been in collusion with the Under Nurse charged with stealing the clothing.

Many of them are anxious to appear before you to vindicate their characters and I ask this on their behalf.

Should the Board be too much occupied with other business, one or two of your Members could investigate the matter in a few minutes.

If they can vindicate themselves I would suggest that Mr Pilkington should be at liberty to select the more experienced of them to resume their duties at least for some time.
