## Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the consideration of claims for relief in the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of the Union and also for out door relief.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year)

In compliance with the Board's Order of last Board day the Master laid before the guardians a list of those females in the House who have illegitimate children - also the names of the children - they were severally called before the Board & examined in order to ascertain if corroborative evidence could be brought forward to prove the paternity of the reputed fathers of their children. Such in the greater number of cases the guardians find that such evidence can be produced and the Clerk is ordered to write to those parties to show if they will support their children as in case of their refusal proceedings will be immediately instituted against them and on this subject the guardians have to request that the Commissioners will be good enough to give them their opinion as to whether the amount of relief given to those children during their residence in the House can be recovered or can their fathers only be met for their maintenance from the date of the passing of the act - with any particulars the Commissioners may deem proper to state.

Ordered, that the present staff of Infirmary nurses be removed - the Master to select the most suitable persons in the House to replace them.

A Receipt was produced to the Board for £150 - lodged by James Doyle on Egniscorthy Division which the guardians deem very satisfactory and trust the other collectors will exert themselves in like manner.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

## Masters Report

The Threshing Machine arrived here and commenced threshing about 12 O'clock yesterday. He sent out all hands available. The Schoolmaster, all the boys, the Sailer, Shoemaker, and the School girls for the purpose of attending the Machine. He has got up only what food covers the mens' yard and wall at the female side. The womens' yard, two Infirmary yards & wall at male side require to be sheeted. He would suggest that some persons be engaged to raise a sufficient quantity of mud out of the mill as the animals will have plenty of time to draw it up. The new door from the female yard into the Chapel requires an additional step as also the new door from mens' yard to the dining hall.



Ordered, The Committee consisting of Messrs. Hore, Bolger & Tennott to view the yards and to agree with some party to raise the sand and place the additional steps required. Messrs. Hore, Tennott & Bolger examined the sample of meat submitted by the Master & reported it of good quality.

The Agricultural Visitors Inspection Book showed the following entry,

The Agricultural Clap has retrograded considerably in proficiency since my last visit and I have also observed that they appear much less orderly, attentive and respectful than I heretofore found them. The state of the Farm Cultivation is not so satisfactory as usual. The culture is defective as to cleanliness in a great many instances and a portion of the land has been left unropped. The great falling off in the number of hands available for working the farm together with the change of management that has occurred since my last visit are sufficient to account for this backwardness at present. I trust that by increased energy and a better and more systematic course of management these defects will be avoided in future.

The Board have let the house at the former Ten Shillings per Ann to Robert Corry.



## Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the admission of applicants to relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospital of the Union also to out-door relief.

Mary Collins and illegitimate child 10 years old were admitted. She stated she lived at Bolgers in Ferns as a general Servant - the father of her child is Patrick Doyle who often came to her at Bolgers and passed himself off as her husband and the family thought he was married to her.

Catharine Byrne and illegitimate child aged 4 years were admitted to relief and stated that the father of the child was James Hermon.

Rev Edward Doyle Manager applied for the boy Patrick Kinsella aged 16 years. The boy was called before the Board and expressed his willingness to go.

Ordered, Clothing Value 16/- allowed

Mr Pickington of the News Office Castle complained of working that on the 4th inst. the Clerk had written to him to have certain printing work delivered at the Board Room by 12 o'clock on that day. That he came up to the Porter to speak about it as the printing had been delivered at 9 o'clock that morning. The Porter abused him in a frightful manner telling him to go about his business - Slap'd the door several times and stood at it repeating the abuse for several minutes until he was out of sight. This is the fourth time the Porter so treated him and he hopes the Board will be so good as to caution him not to act in this manner towards him in future.

A Tender to supply the Workhouse with best White Bread, Flour, oatmeal and India meal was read from Mr Thomas Neohler Min. Bread 6<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> p 4 lbs. First flour 18/6 p cent Oat meal 15/- p cent and India meal at 8/8 p cent.

Another Tender to supply best White Bread only at the rate of 6/- p 4 lbs was read from Mr Thomas Doyle.

Ordered, That the Tender of Thomas Doyle for Bread be accepted for 3 months and that the Clerk again advertise for Tenders for first flour, Oat meal and India meal for 3 or 6 months, as the Board may determine on reading the Tenders.

## Masters Report

The Board gave directions some years ago that all letters sent to the inmates should come thro' the Master. The reason of this order was that some of the Officers were in the habit of receiving money for the inmates and giving it to them—consequently irregular practices were carried on of buying provisions and causing other inmates to sell their food, and as he has good reason to believe that the system is again carried on to some extent he trusted the Board will



put a stop to such a practice.

As the Schoolboys have of late got the habit of crossing the wall into the garden in front of the Hall door and thence into the girls yard it is necessary that the Schoolmaster pay every attention to the preventing of such a practice.

As it appears some irregularity has occurred by parties being allowed to enter the Infirmary, he has to request that the head nurse receive instructions to keep the pass key herself at all times if practicable.

An idiot named James Nolan became refractory and forced his way into the Chapel at prayers time after which he refused to leave - he was armed with large spikes fastened in small blocks of wood with which he inflicted wounds on three or four of the inmates whilst removing him. The Master had him brought before the Magistrate on Thursday last when they committed him to goal as a dangerous lunatic.

That he had a form of admission sent to the Carlin Asylum for the admission of one of the Lunatics named James Mone. Some years ago he established a system which is the rule and which, he found to work well altho not previously carried out - <sup>the following is the</sup> that any Officer having any complaint whatsoever or any small to make that such Officer put down writing to the Master and have it regularly entered on the punishment Book and as that is the proper system of doing business he hoped the Board will order a continuance of same.

Ordered, The original Order respecting letters to inmates to be carried into effect. The Schoolmaster to get notice not to permit the boys to pass otherwise than thro' the gates from one yard to the other - the head nurse to get notice to keep the pass key in her own custody. We beg to suggest that three of the nurses who were discharged be reinstated - We also suggest that all the old looms and bundles be sold by auction.
