Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the consideration of claims for relief in the Workhouse and Devon Hospitals of the Union - also to set down relief in certain cases.

A letter from Doctor Sayler was read stating in reply to the inquiry made by the Board on their minutes of Saturday last that Sarah Reilly did not own a thorn but from receipt of the accident to her removal to the Workhouse she inadvertently occupied the family sitting room at Mr. Donnell's besides that she a cabin she could not be properly treated there from want of skilled attendance and the necessary appliances for cleanliness & consequent on such a severe injury - for these reasons it appeared necessary to transport her to the Union Hospital,

The Board proceeded to consider the case of Alexander McDonnell - Schoolmaster appointed upon last Board day. The Schoolmaster sent in to the Board the following explanation which was read,

Gentlemen In reference to the Pater's Charge of the 3rd September I beg to state that I have nothing to add to my former explanation namely that having walked a good deal about the Cattle show on that evening - having taken a few glasses of wine & being only 3 days convalescent from fever - I became sick & weak - with respect to the Pater's other statement that

he brought under the Masters notice on two other occasions on which he said I was drunk. I beg most respectfully to say that the charge is so vague and indefinite it is impossible for me to reply but the Master has already told you that when he visited my room on one of these occasions - I was not drunk.

He was then called before the Board and explained that the cap alleged by the Pater to have been buried whilst he was in an intoxicated state - was not a fact - that it was torn or savalled at the top - and he took it from his head & showed it to the Board - and as to the burn on his coat, he stated it occurred whilst talking to the Warden over the Dykes - and standing at the fire place in that Ward with him which the Warden could confirm. After a little time the Board desired he would withdraw and he was requested to put in his resignation in writing. Before doing so - he stated he threw himself on the Board that if they gave him some time to look out for a situation and allow him to leave their service without injury to his character he would write a resignation as they desired - on being assured the Board should not object to a fair extension of time - he did withdraw & soon after returned with the following written resignation.

Gentlemen: Thereby tends my resignation as Schoolmaster to this Workhouse trusting you will allow me to remain some time with a view to give me an opportunity of providing another situation.
