Dated 6<sup>th</sup> July 1866 Requesting to be informed whether the No. 1353 several Dispensary Medical Officers have since furnished lists of the defaulters under the compulsory vaccination act in compliance with the order of the guardians.

Ordered, None of the Medical Officers have sent in lists except Doctors Taylor & Campbell and the Clerk was directed to write to them again requesting their lists would be sent in before this day week.

In reference to a note was read from Dr. Taylor stating that since he had the notices to defaulters served 26 children had been brought in for vaccination and 6 others produced Certificates of having been vaccinated - after this the Clerk made and sent for who have left the District leave only a very small number unaccounted for of all his defaulters - he hesitated recommending to have them summoned lest they should also produce Certificates and stating he would look after any who still remained out & report to the Board.
