Statements made in writing on the following Books by the Auditor at his visit last week.

#### Application and Report Book

"The information supplied on the face of this Book regarding applications for Relief out of the Workhouse is very imperfect and in many Cases it is impossible to determine whether the Relief afforded has been given to persons really entitled to it. Article 51 no 3 of the General Regulations directs that the Relieving Officer shall examine into the Circumstances of every Case by visiting the home of the Applicant and by making all necessary enquiries into the State of health, ability to work and previous earnings and other means of each Applicant and to report the Result of such enquiries in the prescribed Form entitled the Application and Report Book. The Relieving Officer has not complied with his instructions in this regard and I find it necessary to caution him that from this date forward I shall debit him with any relief given by him which does not appear to be justified by the facts as set forth on the face of his Book.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this was the second Meeting after the Annual Election of Guardians)

#### Daily Diet Book

"This Book has been kept in a very informal manner the Computations instead of being made by the Master himself or under his immediate Control have been made by an Hospital Assistant and in my Opinion no sufficient Charge has been applied to them by the Master. I have pointed out to him that according to the Regulations this Book ought to be kept by himself and I have explained to him the manner in which it should be kept and in the event of his failing to comply with the instructions I have given him I shall on my next Visit to the Union bring his Conduct under the notice of the Commissioners.

I have also explained to the Med<sup>l</sup> Officer that all Extra's prescribed by him for Patients either in the body of the House or in the Workhouse Hospital whether in food, provisions or Stimulants must be ordered in his own handwriting.

#### Farm Account Book

"The attention of the Board of Guardians is requested to the Circumstance that the Sums set forth in the opposite page marked A are still due on account of Farm produce sold previously to the 29th September last and that there is a considerable sum outstanding on account of farm produce sold since the 29th of September.

Ordered, The Chairman pointed out the importance of the remarks of the Auditor and first to the Relieving Officers. They have promised to attend to their duties in this regard hereafter in future.



The remarks on the daily diet Book for the Sick were read to the Master and he promised to keep the Book as directed by the Auditor

In reference to the entry on the Farm Book the sums due are by solvent parties and the Master is directed to proceed at once to collect in the outstanding debts for Farm Produce and to report to the Board in case of any delay in the payment.

The Board have further Resolved that in future no Credit be given unless for Cabbages alone & for each plot of which before being severed a Bond must be given as at present.

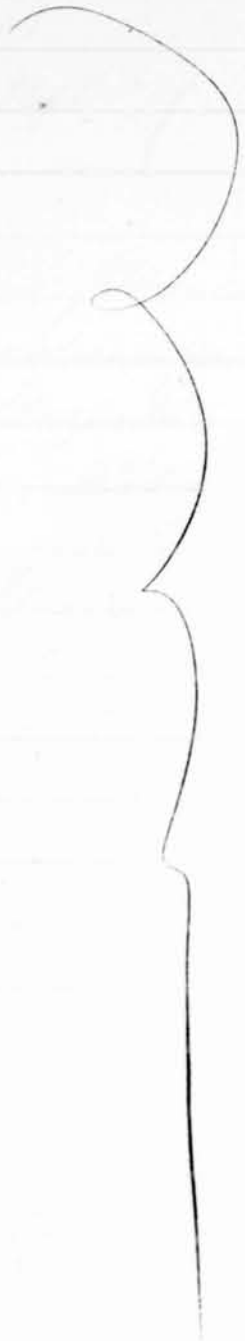

I visited all the Wards - Infirmary and School and the inmates appeared contented - the rooms neat & clean and every thing in the most perfect order. I also went thro the schools (male & female) and heard the pupils examined in reading. I was very much pleased with their progress.

The Matron and Mr. Murray were most attentive and anxious to explain the details of every department and I was gratified to observe the kindly feeling which seemed to exist between the poor and those who were placed over them.
