I very much regret to have to report of a sudden outbreak of fever with the female school children. I found a few of them ill on Friday and on the following day there were 15 attacked who were apparently well the previous night. I had to send 18 to Derry Hospital amongst whom were two boys.

The Dermatitis were linewashed and fumigated.

There was no new Case since Saturday. I cannot account for this sudden illness. I also regret to report the illness of the Scholmistrress with fever having been attacked on the same day with the children. She is not very ill at present and she is going on so far favorably. There is a Nurse tender with her.
