 Hospital - being allowed to die without a Clergyman
 being sent for,

Terence O'Brien Relieving Officer being
 examined, stated that the parson for Balmacorney
 came to him and took him to the house where Bridget Doyle
 lay sick - she was lying on a bed of straw on a damp
 floor - she told him she wished to go to the
 Workhouse, asked her was she attended by either
 Priest or Doctor, she said not - that Father Roche
 was sent for twice to come to her - but as he was sick
 he did not come. The Relieving Officer then
 got a Car and brought her to the Workhouse, at
 the Workhouse door she asked him would she get the
 Priest here and he told her she would as soon as admitted,
 he then left her in charge of the master,

Doctor O'Rourke saw B Doyle about
 5 O'clock on the evening of Wednesday the 26th 21st
 having been sent for by the Master she was then
 in an advanced state of Fever - but she was not in immediate
 danger - would not leave her all that night without
 having a Clergyman sent for if she had been in the
 Workhouse - saw her but once and then gave directions
 to have her sent to Derry Hospital.

James Doyle - Porter at the Hospital
 stated that when Bridget Doyle was admitted he told
 Mr. Flynn the head Nurse that she had not got
 the Priest - that the usual course on admission of
 Derry Patients is to ask if they had the Priest,

Eliza Flynn - Nurse being examined
 stated that she did not see any sign of immediate
 death in the woman - she took particular care
 of her during the time she was in Hospital, she stayed
 with her until 12 O'clock that night and then gave
 charge of her to Eliza Tennant - one of her assistants, the
 Woman died at 6 O'clock the next morning,

Another assistant Mary Murphy came to her
 a few minutes before six and told her that Bridget
 Doyle was dying, she told her to go to the Porter
 at once and send him for the Priest and in a minute or
 two the other assistant Eliza Tennant came & told
 her that B Doyle was dead, word was not sent
 to the Porter in consequence, Bridget Doyle
 never told her she wished to have the Priest,

Dr. Johnson saw her about 9 O'clock he then prescribed
 for her & left, the usual course is - if a Patient be in
 a dangerous state she sends for the Priest herself but
 she did not think that B Doyle was then in that
 state. The Porter told her about 8 O'clock that
 the Woman had not been attended by the Priest,

Doctor Johnson being examined stated that he saw the Patient at 9 O'Clock and did not consider her to be in immediate danger of death. He prescribed for her and then left, when he sees any danger he gives directions for the Priest to be sent for. He did not see her but once.

Elysa Tomoth - assistant Nurse stated she took charge of the Patient at 8 O'Clock - that Mrs Elye was with her up to 12 O'Clock. When the time she took charge the Patient B Doyle did not say she wished for the Priest - that she did not ask all to her knowledge ask for the Priest.

Mary Murphy assistant Nurse stated that Bridget Doyle was placed under her charge about 1/2 past 7 O'Clock - did not consider her in immediate danger - she was in her senses - she undressed her and whilst in charge she never expressed a wish for the Priest.

Ordered that Mrs Elye be reprimanded and informed that if she allows such a neglect of duty to occur again she will be at once discharged, that in future the Clergyman shall get notice to attend immediately after the admission of a Patient into Fever Hospital.
