Enclosing a copy of their Inspectors report on his recent visit to this Workhouse and Dever Hospitals of the Union - that he found the Workhouse clean and in good order and its sanitary condition satisfactory - that the schools are in general well conducted, but more attention is necessary on the part of the schoolmistress to the dress and personal appearance of the children in her charge, - that three of the Windows in the male School Cells should be enlarged in the same manner that those on the female side have been altered, and advised that the persons in charge of the male and female Prison Wards should be enabled to call the Master or Matron at night by means of Bells hung near the doors of those Officers sleeping apartments and that in the same manner the persons in charge of the School Wards should be afforded greater facilities for communicating with the Infirmary Nurse in case she should be required at night. Mr. Robinson observes that such arrangements have been made in other Unions and prevent any inconvenience that might arise from locking up the classes referred to during the night. He also further observed that the Enniscommey Dever Hospital was in good order and clean but the yard gate requires repair as well as the ceiling of the entrance porch. The Dever Hospital at Ennistown is reported as having been in fair order in regard to cleanliness but the inside of the building requires whitewashing and some of the Windows to be glazed - that the ground about the Hospital and the yard are in a very unkempt and neglected state. He suggests that the Justices should authorize the employment of some person to put them into



proper order and to keep them so,

He states that the Nurse at the N. H. Barry Hospital informed him that she and her assistant have not drawn their meat rations since the beginning of August in consequence of the Contractor sending in meat of such bad quality and the Commissioners decide to state that the Contractor should be compelled to supply this Hospital with good meat and at same time request that the guardians will be good enough to give their consideration to the several matters referred to and make the necessary orders thereon,
