The family is in this neighbourhood only 10 days. The woman into whose charge the child was given finding herself unable to support it

came to me for advice - I directed her to take the child to Shillelagh Workhouse - the mother being a County Wexford girl - the child being born and lived there since its birth 2 years ago - The guardians of Shillelagh Union refused to admit the child saying it had become chargeable on our Union - but as I am confident that the child belongs to Shillelagh Union - Will the Board be so good as to inform me what steps should be taken to get rid of the child which she is quite unable to support, or if admitted into the Enniscorthy Workhouse will the guardians be able to send it to Shillelagh or compel the guardians of that Union to take it?
