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Auditors Report December 4<sup>th</sup> 1869.

The mode in which the receipt and consumption of food, necessities &c is kept on the outlying Hospitals in this Union at Newtown Barry and Oulart is very unsatisfactory. So far as I can learn no proper check can be applied to the Books kept in those Hospitals and having regard to the form of Books kept no sufficient check can be applied to them by the paid Officers of the Union.

In the N.T. Barry Hospital a Provision Book is in use in which the number in Hospital on each day is entered up as also the quantities of the various articles received into Hospital but there is no record of the consumption of such articles.

In the Oulart Hospital the receipt and consumption of food is recorded in a form similar to the Provision Check and receipt and consumption account kept in the Workhouse, but the classification of diets which of course must vary according to the necessities of the cases treated not being known it is impossible to apply any check to the record of the consumption of articles of diet in that Hospital.

The Bills for the articles supplied are furnished periodically to the Medical Officer who lays them before the Hospital Committee by whom they are passed and are then forwarded to the Clerk of the Union who checks the prices and procures payment but beyond this little or no check is at present applied.

In the form in which the account of provisions is at present kept I do not well see how any sufficient check can be applied and I would suggest that the Medical Officers should be required to adopt a fixed diet scale for each Hospital; that a new and special form of Provision

Books should be procured in which the classification will be arranged according to the Diet in use — that the numbers on each Diet daily should be set out and summarized at the end of each week and the consumption of foods &c computed according to a fixed diet & shown — and the receipts compared with the consumption and balanced weekly. That the Books so ~~expected~~<sup>kept</sup> should be kept checked by the Clerk at such periods as may be determined upon by the Guardians and the Bills compared in every case and be duly certified as having been so compared before being paid.

He further reported in reference to the Dever Hospital at Enniscommey. I find that the Dever Hospital which is supported altogether out of the poor rates is so far as regards the mode in which its supplies are procured and accounted for — treated as a separate Institution altho it adjoins the Workhouse. The Medical Officer furnishes a requisition of the articles required.

The articles enumerated are ordered by the Board of Guardians sent direct to the Dever Hospital by the Contractors where they are accounted for on separate Books kept by the Porter in charge. The Master of the Workhouse does not consider himself accountable for the Books kept — the Clerk states that he checks them.

I don't see why this Dever Hospital should not as in other Unions be treated as a portion of the Workhouse so far as regards supplies and I would suggest for the consideration of the Board of Guardians whether it would not be advisable to have all articles required for use in this Dever Hospital sent from the main House instead of being sent direct from the Contractor and their application be accounted for by the Porter of the Hospital under the immediate superintendence

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of the Masters of the Workhouse

Ordered, The Relieving Officer has given the following satisfactory explanation to this Board and the case is to be left under his care.

In reference to the Commissioners letter concerning the case of Philip Fleming I beg leave to state that on Wednesday the 22<sup>nd</sup> December his brother first applied to me and at the same time issued a ticket for the Medical Officer to visit him who did so and on Thursday the 23<sup>rd</sup> Inst. I brought his case before the Board of Guardians who allowed the applicant 3<sup>d</sup> of week and I paid his brother the first 3<sup>d</sup> on same day the 26<sup>th</sup> Inst. I visited the dwelling place of the applicant



and I found himself and his father in bed — I at the same time gave provisional relief to the amount of 2/6 and on the 28<sup>th</sup> Inst — I again visited the applicants — taking with me a covered car with the intention of conveying them to the Workhouse Infirmary — if the Medical Officer would allow me to do so, — The Medical Officer visited along with me and after examining the applicants he informed me that I could remove the father but that it would be dangerous to remove his son — I then had the father conveyed to the Workhouse Infirmary where he is at present and on this day I brought the case fully before the Board of Guardians and they directed me to supply the applicant that could not be removed with any movement that is requisite for his case,

The Board proceeded to consider the applications for relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union — also to Out-door relief in certain cases,

Letter from Dr. Forchason requesting the Board to fix his remuneration for attendance on the patients in the Workhouse Infirmary during the absence of Doctor O'Rourke,

He stated that he appeared on part of the poor of the large district surrounding that Hospital and presented letters from the Rev. Mr. Pardon Castle Ellis, Rev. Mr. Cornwell & Rev. Mr. Keeney against closing the Hospital, adding on his own part facts to show its utility to the district which he knew intimately during the last 17 years,

After which it was moved by Mr. John Murphy & seconded by Mr. Edward O'Brien that the Resolution and Amendment thereof passed by the Board on the Second Inst. for the closing of the Oulart Fever Hospital on the 1<sup>st</sup> of July 1870 be rescinded,

To which an Amendment was moved that a Committee be appointed to confer with the Guardians of the Jurey Union to come to a better arrangement with regard to the maintenance of the Oulart Hospital,

The Chairman then took votes when there appeared to be 9 for & 9 against and declared the amendment lost,

The Chairman then took votes on the original motion and declared it to be carried with the understanding that the following

That a Committee of this Board consisting of Col. Fleet, Messrs.
