Having heard from one of the women that the Nation sent her with word to her (Mary Oakes) that the Police were after coming for her — she did not insist on staying in the House longer and left with her children,

Eliza Denton — an inmate requested the Board to allow her a pair of shoes to enable her to leave the House,
