Roberts did not apply to me for out door relief for the boy nor did he tell me that the boy was destitute - nor did he ask me for a mode of conveyance and under these circumstances I did not consider it my duty to visit him.

but I was inclined to have him placed on the Poor Book for relief by Way of Loan considering it just that the proper parties should pay for his support.

The boy being delicate I told Roberts not to remove him until he would get a Certificate from Dr. Wood whether he could be removed or not and that if he did remove him it would be on his own responsibility - also that if anything occurred he would have to answer for him.

At the time I had no ticket Book with me
