Confidently hoping the Board will remunerate me with the same liberality they did on a former similar occasion for the extra duty I had to perform.

The following Letter of explanation was read and ordered to be placed on the Minutes

Clonroche Dispensary Aug. 28th 1872

My Lord & Gentlemen,

I have read Mr. Downes charge of neglect of duty which he brought against me on Thursday and regret that he should have any occasion to do so, but I think I can show you that I am not so negligent as he would lead you to suppose. On the 30th July I visited two patients at Rathturtin named Michael Kehoe and James Carroll. Kehoe had evidently suffered from some febrile attack from which he was recovering and principally complained of pain and swelling in his leg with debility, he is now going on pretty well. Carroll was suffering from Low or Gastric Fever and was advancing towards convalescence, having as I was informed, been ill for a fortnight. I visited both patients next day, I again visited the 4th August, on the 11th of August having received a message (but not from any clergyman) that Carroll was not so well, I visited on that day, when I did so he seemed progressing favorably. On the 19th his wife came to the Dispensary reported very favorably of him, got a repetition of his Medicine and asked if he might have a little butter as he wanted something to eat. I gave permission. I fully expected if any unfavorable change would take place his wife would let me know as she promised to do so but she did not and I went there last Friday and found he had relapsed, I visited again on Saturday and found him sinking, on Sunday he died.

I am now over 25 years Medical Attendant of Clonroche Dispensary and having had the reputation of being attentive to my duties for that period, I regret indeed that such an occurrence should have taken place through any seeming neglect of mine. But I trust you will bear in mind that I have a very large district and that my duties are at all times arduous. As it may sometimes happen that I could not give that very great attention which I could wish and Mr. Downes seems to require. I hope to be in Enniscorthy on Thursday and afford any further explanation, and trust that what I have said may be satisfactory.

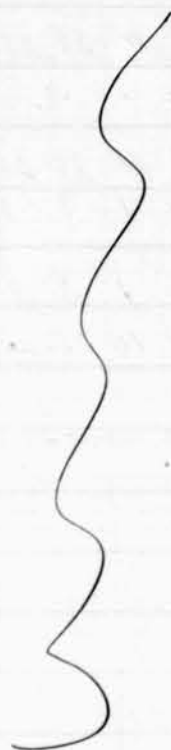
