The Reports of the Master and others Officers were read and Orders made thereon, as follows:-

Masters Report

That Mr. Murphy Coroner held an Inquest on the bodies of John Murphy and James Duffield on Saturday last. John Murphy was admitted here from the Asylum on the 1st Inst last and was placed by the Doctor in the Infirmary. After some time he became uneasy and then had a seizure & came here at night. I then removed him to the Idiot Ward on Thursday last by the Doctors directions, and on Friday had a form of Admission to the Asylum signed by the Doctor and Church Warden but I could not have it fully completed until Saturday when I intended to have him removed to the Asylum. I in Company with the Matron and Nurse saw him at 8 o'clock on Friday night, afterwards I saw him at 1/2 past 9 o'clock and told Henry the Warden on leaving to be particularly careful of Murphy and to watch him during the night as he had

Made a suicidal attempt about the day before and that I would have him removed next day to the Asylum, and next morning at 6 o'clock I went to his Cell and found him dead he having suspended himself from the window of the Cell by part of the sheet which he had torn - I then cut him down, he was quite warm but life was extinct. I invariably visit the men in their Wards at 9 o'clock at night and 6 o'clock in the morning, I also visit the Infirmary at the same hours. Duffield died from an Epileptic fit, I herewith give the Verdict of the Jury in both Cases.

" We find that John Murphy came by his death in one of the Cells of the Idiot Ward in Emuiscorthy Work House on the 7th day of February 1874 by hanging - having suspended himself from the Window Sash of his Cell - he being then insane. We wish to add that there is no blame to be attached to any of the Work House Officials, and we also suggest that the Board of Guardians would take the Services of John Keenan the Warden into Consideration with the view of giving him additional Rations. "

" We further find that James Duffield came by his death at the Work House of Emuiscorthy on the 7th of Feb'y. 1874 from Natural Causes - to wit - Epilepsy

Ordered: No further Rations allowed and we consider John Keenan neglected his duty in not having seen the man during the night

Mr Murphy has delivred the linen pleas to have it inspected.

Ordered: Inspected & found equal to Sample.






