Sir/

In compliance with the Request of the Board of Guardians I have to inform them that there is no change in the Law which when Warrants of Attorney are attached to the Bonds and such Warrants are only requisite when it is intended to enter Judgments within 21 days from date of Warrant, but in every case where it may be considered advisable to have Judgment entered — then the Party executing the Bond and Warrant must sign same in presence of an Attorney who must explain to him the consequences of his act and and attest the execution as His Attorney. If the Act of Parliament be not complied with in this respect the Warrant will be useless.

I believe your Bonds with Contractors for Stones &c have not Warrants of Attorney annexed and these may continue to be executed and stamped in the ordinary way.

Sir — I have received extract from the Board's Minutes of the 7th Inst^r referring to me the question raised by a resolution of the Committee of Management of Newtown Barry Fever Hospital and Dispensary relative to a dispute arising from alleged trespass of fowls on land said to belong to the Fever Hospital at Newtown Barry and calling the attention of the Guardians to the matter with the view of having the boundary of said Hospital ground defined and properly fenced,

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

I presume the question has been referred to me in consequence of my having being engaged in defence of the ejectment on the title brought against the Guardians by the late Mr. Hall-Dare in 1863 — The only matter then in controversy was the piece of ground in the actual occupation of the Guardians containing about 20 perches on which stood the Fever Hospital, out office and yard enclosed by a wall — If a right to any land outside of this be now claimed, I am not in a position to give any information as to the boundaries of it, or of the site originally intended by Lord Farnham for the Hospital, for this question was not involved in the issue to be tried by the ejectment. — However I learned incidentally in the course of my enquiries that the exemptions in the Ordnance Survey comprised "Fever Hospital and land 1, 0, 28" ^{A.R.P.} statute measure, and that formerly the field upon which the Hospital stands was not let or tilled by the Proprietor, but that when Mr. Ashton purchased he tilled the greater portion of this field and that same afterwards continued to be and was then in the occupation of the Proprietor or his tenants, Mr. Hall Dare obtained a verdict against the Guardians at the Summer assizes 1863 ~~which~~ which was afterwards set aside and a new trial was granted on the terms of Mr. Hall Dare paying the Guardians the cost of the first trial — which he did, But the case was not again brought on in the lifetime of the late Mr. Hall-Dare, and since his death, his son, the present Mr. Hall Dare took no steps to prosecute the action, Of course if the boundaries of the ground which the Committee consider of right belongs to the Hospital be disputed it would be most desirable to have them defined by an amicable arrangement, but any legal proceedings by the Guardians to recover any portion of land which may have been originally intended for the Hospital, but is in possession of Mr. Hall Dare or his tenant would raise a different question and be attended with many more difficulties than defending their right to what is in their possession.

Unless therefore their long established rights which have not been questioned since 1863 be interfered with, I advise the Guardians not to involve themselves in litigation about the matter, such litigation would be very costly.

I have received your note accompanied by the last three year Report Books kept by me at the Workhouse directing my attention as a favor to the Board for a return of the number of times I had to complain of the Whiskey supplied by Mr. Fitzpatrick during the last 3 years - I need not say how much pleasure it would give me to assist you by complying with the Board's request at any time.

I have looked over my reports and find in no instance have I reported any Contractor, not considering it my duty to do so, but when I found any article supplied to the House not equal to that contracted for I immediately reported it to the Master whose duty it is to report on and have it corrected to the Board.

I made a summarily report on the Supplies on the 8 May 1893 to which I direct your attention as containing my experience of the year then ending. The object I had in view was to direct the attention of the Guardians to their future Contracts, but not accusing any particular Contractor in the discharge of his duties as this solely was the responsibility of the Master, to report as Mr. Kennedy.

at Contract strength. It had often to be returned and whiskey same strength sent. The Master will be able to explain. The wines were middling only, the Port which had to be returned once was accounted for by recent bottling, the Brandy was very inferior and went only 17 per cent under proof. The Contractor for meat had to be frequently remonstrated with and the meat returned. The Colman's best Mustard was contracted for only in one instance and upon great exertion on part of the Master was the genuine quality supplied. Colman's British Cornflour was also advertised for and accepted but in no instance has a packet been supplied, I beg to call particular attention to the Mustard as being very serious, the application of bad Mustard may endange loss of life and be useless in case of emergency. I would nearly say the same of the Corn flour as Colman's preparation is most nutritious both to young and delicate persons in need of its use, the other supplies I have no necessity to notice unless brought under my Special Observation.
