They find that in the first week in December 1873, Seventeen Patients Consumed weekly - nearly one fallon one quart. That for the Corresponding period 1874 Twenty-nine Patients Consumed Weekly nearly 3 fallons - The apparent discrepancy may be accounted for by the fact that in several instances larger doses were given by the present than the late Medical Officer.

Your Committee annex for the guidance of the Board a Tabular statement of the several Patients Consuming Whiskey at present in the Workhouse, shewing 1st Old Cases or those receiving Whiskey in the late Medical Officers Time and Continued by the present, 2nd, Intermediate Cases or those who were in Hospital under the

Under all the circumstances your Committee are of opinion taking into consideration the number of Infirm Patients and the evidence of the Medical Officer that the weekly amount of Whiskey Consumed is not excessive.
