

That on the 8th of October last Mr. Finlay wrote to
me requiring the abstracts of the accounts of 29th September
to be made out as he would attend early in November
to audit those of the 25th March and would take both Half
years at the same visit. This was to me very unexpected
being unusual in a month that I had to attend Quarter
Sessions in New Ross, Wexford, Forey, Enniscorthy and Tullow
Co Carlow for revision of Parliamentary Voters and Jurors
lists, besides my duties under the Births, Death and Mar-
riages acts. Still in obedience to his request I worked
day and night and forwarded the abstracts to him
5 days previous to his notice of audit, so great was
the pressure of night work that it brought on a violent
attack of Neuralgia and when this was nearly subdued
I went to my duties in the office and caught a cold bringing
on Bronchitis so that I was rendered incapable of
attending his audits. When Mr. Finlay did come
in December, He went thro the March accounts only.

He

He made no remark at that Audit of the September acc^{ts} not being balanced altho in the Table at foot of the Abstracts sent to him in November it was shown that the Credit side was £11" 8" 2 heavier than the Dr^{'s} side. Had Mr. Finlay spoke of the discrepancy it would have been discovered before his visit of the 17th March and the Audit could have been concluded, - that discrepancy has since been found and those accounts properly closed and balanced.

Mr. Finlay Certified so many of the accounts of September Treasurers, Omission, Disbursements and all the Vouchers for payments - that it cannot occupy more than an hour or so at his next visit to enable him to conclude his Audit.

I have promised Mr. Finlay through my assistant to check the Relieving Officers Books from the Application and Report Book each week as pointed out in the Letter of the 20th January No 267 and he will see I have done so on his next visit.

In reference to the irregularities of Chargeability Complain^{ts} if they have been transferred under proper headings of acc^{ts} as directed by Mr. Finlay on the 18th March and will appear so when he comes, I had not previously received the least instruction how to charge the Amount paid for the Horses &c bought at Sheriff's Sale and I have strong reason to hope for excuse in making up the September accounts under the pressure of time above stated.

Mr. Finlay states he has a strong feeling of distrust as to the accounts of this Union and in self defence I hope I may be permitted to enclose copy of a letter received from the late Auditor, Mr. M. Gerrmott for information of the Board.
