With regard to the enquiry as to the area of chargeability of the amount expended weekly for clearing and watering the stench-traps throughout the town of Enniscorthy requesting to be informed of the names of the townlands situated wholly or partly in the town referred to.

In reply to the further enquiry as to the manner of charging expenses incurred in prosecuting defaulters under the Sanitary Acts, stating that as the expenses incurred by the Rural Sanitary Authority in these cases are general expenses and when not recovered from the owners or occupiers they should be charged on the Common fund or Union at large.

Ordered, The townlands comprising the town of Enniscorthy are, Enniscorthy (within township boundary), Templehammon (within township boundary), and Kellagley (within township boundary).
