I see with the greatest pleasure that you have had the generous spirit of engaging the devoted services of the Wexford Infirmary Nurses as nurses in your Workhouse hospital.

To remove every possibility of misunderstanding arising hereafter between you and them I beg to point out to you a little difficulty

The bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

which will occur on their coming as well as to suggest a very simple way whereby it can be safely removed.

These good Ladies are bound by a rule of their Institute which they can neither violate nor ignore. to assist a holy mass each morning.

Now as on the one hand mass could not be celebrated at the Workhouse five or six days in the week instead of one without a corresponding increase of salary which you would not be prepared to give and as on the other it would be too much to expect the sisters after the fatiguing duties of the night to go every morning on foot in all weathers to the Cathedral. I would take the liberty of advising that a horse and car be placed each day required for a half hour in the morning at the disposal of the sisters to convey them to the Cathedral.
