Agriculturist's Report,

As the Agricultural Committee has recommended the application of lime to No 5 plot which is intended for a crop of Barley, the Board will please give directions as to the quantity and from whom it will be procured.

The most part of this farm is composed of stiff clay, the soil is naturally deep and he ploughed it deep. Consequently it will require a larger dose of lime than would be sufficient for a light soil and more particularly as there has been no lime applied to this plot for some time.

Joseph Bass was admitted to the House on the 24th Ultimo and seen by me on his admission, he was suffering from Cancer but not in that state at the time that I imagined he required the minister. On Thursday the 27th Ult. the Rev Mr. Moore the Protestant Curate visited 2 Protestant patients in the ward adjoining the Ward where Bass was. the Under nurse who was over both Wards went to Bass and told him the Rev Mr. Moore the Minister was in the next Ward and asked did he wish to see him, he said, no. that he wanted to see the Priest (this I did not hear until since) then on the next day Friday I was sent for and told that Bass wished to change his religion. I went to see him and asked him did he require a Clergyman, he said yes, I asked him which was it the Minister or Priest he wanted, he said the Priest, that he wanted to make his Confession. He was then very low and weak, so much so that he died on the Morning of the 5th Instant, about 10 o'clock am.

I therefore most respectfully request that the Guardians will thoroughly investigate the matter.
