I will thank you to bring the matter before their notice, and draw their attention to the annexed Statement made upon the matter by our Chairman, the Right Hon. Baron EMLY.

Resolution adopted by Limerick Board of Guardians of
20th December, 1876.

Proposed by Lord EMLY; seconded by Alderman TINSLEY:—

"That this Board are deeply sensible of the serious injury inflicted on the poorer classes by the insufficient jurisdiction of the Irish County Courts. That we earnestly press upon the Government the importance of introducing into Parliament that portion of the Bill of last Session which dealt with this grievance, and to add to it a provision preventing Litigants from taking, in the first instance, to the Superior Courts, cases which can be decided by the County Courts."

The bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

The following Statement, made by the Right Hon. Lord Emly, when introducing the Resolution to the notice of the Limerick Board of Guardians, is published for the information of other Boards in Ireland:—

I gave notice a few days ago that I would take an early opportunity of drawing the attention of the Board to the injury inflicted on the poor by the defective jurisdiction of our County Courts, presided over by the Chairman of Quarter Sessions. I need make no apology for asking you to consider this question, for you are the guardians of the poor; and, indeed, Boards of Guardians, composed as they are of men of all classes, are the bodies which most truly represent the feelings and opinions of the country. You are probably aware that a Bill, to redress the grievances, I am about to bring before you, was introduced last Session into the House of Commons by the present Government. It was not favourably regarded by the Legal Profession in Dublin, who feared it might, if it became law, deprive them of business. It did not pass. Yet the jurisdiction it proposed to confer on our County Courts has been enjoyed by the County Courts of Scotland for more than a century, and by the County Courts of England since 1865. What imaginable reason is there that those advantages should not be conferred on the less wealthy classes here which they possess in the rest of the United Kingdom? Surely one of the primary objects for which Government is constituted is to give every one of its subjects, the poor man as well as the rich, a cheap and efficacious way of enforcing his rights. You—most of you—know far better than I do, that the grievance I am complaining of is not a rarely occurring or imaginary one, and that by the absurd provision that equitable rights can be enforced only in the Superior Courts. The expense of enforcing these rights is made so great as to constitute a practical denial of justice, in many important particulars, to any but the rich. You probably will consider the time not lost which may be spent in considering a few of the instances in which the denial of justice takes place. Take the example of lunatics. The relative of any lunatic may, by application to the Court of Chancery, have the person of the lunatic cared for, and his property secured. But this process is so expensive that it is adopted for only one out of every one hundred lunatics in Ireland. For the same reason, one only out of every hundred widows and orphans has his property protected by any court. In stating this fact, DR. HANCOCK, the greatest authority on such subjects, says,

that he has known practical instances of extreme difficulty and hardship in the case of tenants and persons of small property becoming lunatics, or leaving orphans, and "there is no reason," he remarks, "why the poor should not have the same protection as the rich." Take another example of the defective protection afforded by the present law. A farmer has saved three or four hundred pounds, and enters into partnership with a cattle jobber, who is dishonest, and cheats him. There is no remedy for the farmer but a Chancery suit. How many hundred pounds would that suit cost before it was decided? Or a farmer dies without children—a contest arises between his widow and her friends, on the one hand, and the relatives of her deceased husband on the other. The rights of the contending parties cannot be adjudicated upon without a suit in the Superior Courts. For, in case of disputed wills and intestacies, there is no cheap way of obtaining redress where there is any real property at all, or where the personal property left by the deceased exceeds two hundred pounds. In all these circumstances the poor man is as absolutely precluded from enforcing his rights, by law, as if courts of justice did not exist. What is the result? When the law affords no redress, appeal is made to force—family feuds are engendered, assaults are committed by brother on brother, or on cousin by cousin. At last the case does come in a very unpleasant way before the Chairman of the County. Instead of trying a civil cause, he has to try, and perhaps to sentence the man who, if the law had given him the opportunity of vindicating his rights, would have been declared the owner of the property in dispute. Who is responsible for this crime—the poor man in the dock or the Legislature? I don't think the Judge was very far out—

Who sent the wretch who stole the purse, away,
And punished him who put it in his way.

I will mention but one other instance of the injustice caused by the defective jurisdiction of our County Courts. The Chairman's Court can afford no redress for the breach of an agreement concerning land, unless the agreement or some memorandum of it is in writing, and signed by the party to be charged, or his agent. The Court of Chancery, on the other hand, can compel the performance of such an agreement. I quote from an excellent pamphlet by Mr. CONSTANTINE MOLLOY, from which I have taken many of the illustrations of the defects of the present law which I have brought before you.—"The Court of Chancery can compel the performance of the agreement, when a party acting on the faith of it has been put in a position which makes it against conscience for the other party to insist on the absence of a written agreement as a bar to redress." I need not point out to you that you might as well tell a poor farmer to fly to the moon as to send him to the Court of Chancery for redress. The fee-simple of his farm would not pay the law costs. But these are not

the only classes of cases in which the poor man, under the present system, suffers injustice. It appears that in some instances, where a case may be tried locally, the plaintiff in a suit can have it, if he likes, tried in Dublin. One such case was tried the other day before Mr. Justice BARRY, a man of whom, as our fellow-citizen, we are all proud. Mr. Justice BARRY commented in eloquent language on the cruelty of bringing witnesses from remote parts of the country to Dublin, at an expense out of all proportion to the amount in dispute to the means of the parties to pay, and on the positive destruction brought on the wretched parties before him by the caprice of coming up to Dublin to try the case. But I have detained you too long. The case I put before you is clear. It is a scandal and disgrace that such a state of things as I have described should exist. It is pregnant with injustice, and here, as always, injustice is the parent of crime. In this immediate neighbourhood a case has been brought to my notice, where two brothers—respectable men formerly—belonging to a respectable family, have been brought to ruin by a dispute regarding two farms which their father occupied. This dispute the local court had no jurisdiction to settle. A chancery suit is going on which is eating up the small means of the litigants. There have been assaults committed by one brother upon the other—criminal proceedings have more than once been instituted—morally as well as materially these poor men are punished. I wish you to aid in putting a stop to such miseries. I ask you, and through you, the other Boards of Guardians, the Corporations and Chambers of Commerce in Ireland, to express in unmistakable language your determination to insist upon the redress of the grievance I have endeavoured to describe.
