

SUPPOSED CASE OF PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.
The following communications in reference to this case
was read:—

Clonroche, 9th November, 1877.

Sir,—I have to report that a milch cow, the property of Mar-

garet Cowman, of Coolamurry, in this district, and Poor-Law
Union of Ennisecorthy, is suffering, to the best of my knowledge,
from Pleuro-pneumonia or lung distemper.

I saw the animal on yesterday evening, and she presents many
of the symptoms mentioned in the Order in Council of the 8th
July, 1871, a copy of which I have served on Mrs. Cowman, and
directed her to comply strictly with its provisions, till the ani-
mal is inspected by a competent authority.

As I understand that there is no Inspector or Valuer appointed
for the Ennisecorthy Union, as mentioned in Sec. 28, of the Order
in Council of the 26th August, 1877, I beg leave to forward you
this report in order that you may have it sent to the proper quar-
ter. I attach hereto a copy of a report I have sent to the Director
of the Privy Council, Veterinary Department.


