I was informed that such of them as are learning a trade have not a moment out door exercise during the whole day. From morning until they go to bed their whole time (with the exception of meal times) is passed either in the workshops or in the school.

This I believe to be very prejudicial to their growth and health and amongst workhouse children where scrofula is already very prevalent the want of healthy out door exercise must have a very baneful effect. I would suggest that all the school children get at least one and a half or two hours out of doors every day either in recreation or some light employment.

#### CATTLE DISEASES ACT.

The following communication from the Local Government Board was read:—

Sir,—The Local Government for Ireland forward herewith, at the request of His Grace the Lord Lieutenant, four copies of an Order in Council, dated the 11th instant, under the Cattle Disease (Ireland) Act, 1876, together with four copies of "The Pneumonia (Ireland) Order, 1876," dated 14th December, 1876, which is therein referred to, and incorporated therewith, and also, four copies of an Order in Council passed on the 3rd Sept. last, amending the 25th section thereof, and four copies of an Order in Council dated 4th June, relating to the payment of expenses under the order of 14th December. A copy of the Act (39 and 40 Vic., cap. 51), is also enclosed.

The Guardians will observe that, according to the 7th section of the Act, their proceedings under the Act (except where otherwise specially prescribed), are to be regulated by the laws which govern their proceedings as a Board of Guardians under the Poor Relief Acts, and that by the 8th section they are empowered to form a Committee or Committees, and to delegate all or any of the powers conferred by the Act to any such Committee.

Under the 9th section it is their duty, when required by the Lord Lieutenant, to appoint Inspectors and Valuers, and to assign to them such duties, and award them such remuneration as, subject to the terms of the Order, they may think fit; and in reference to this provision the Board desire to draw the attention of the Board of Guardians to paragraphs 6, 7, 14, and 15, of the Order of the 14th December, 1876, the two former of which contain definitions of the terms "Inspector" and "Valuer," and the two latter of which require the Board of Guardians to appoint an Inspector and Valuer without unnecessary delay, and to notify to the Lord Lieutenant, through the medium of the Director of the Privy Council Veterinary Department, the name, residence, and qualification of such Inspector and Valuer, and to employ such Inspector and Valuer on such terms and for such period, as shall be approved by the Lord Lieutenant.

By the 11th section of the Act, the Guardians are required to make such reports to the Lord Lieutenant as the Lord Lieutenant shall require.

By the 12th section, the Guardians are to keep a record relative to their proceedings under the Act, stating the various particulars indicated in the section. This provision of the Act is dealt with in Article 16 and schedule 1 of the Order—the schedule containing the form in which the record is to be kept.

The 14th and 15th sections of the Act relate to the payment of the remuneration to the Inspectors and Valuers, and the compensation payable in respect of animals ordered to be slaughtered, and for the purpose of those sections an account should be opened in the Ledger under the head "Cattle Disease (Ireland) Act, 1876," in which the various payments and receipts made by or to the Treasurer under the provisions of these sections should be entered.

Paragraphs 17 and 18 of the Order require the Guardians to provide fit places for the burial of animals directed to be slaughtered and buried. And paragraphs 25 to 28 detail the proceedings to be taken in regard to any animal which may be ordered to be slaughtered, or slaughtered and buried, with a view to the payment of the compensation which may be awarded.

The Board are informed that the Director of the Veterinary Department of the Privy Council will supply the Guardians with the necessary forms for use in connection with the Order.

The Board desire at the same time to draw the attention of the Board of Guardians to the importance of making careful inquiry, and ascertaining in every case in which compensation is claimed, that the animal in respect of which the claim is made was duly slaughtered, and that they are legally empowered to make the payment demanded by the owners, there being, as the Board understand, no authority for such payments in cases in which the animals have died and have not been slaughtered by order of the Inspector under the Cattle Disease (Ireland) Act, 1876.
