I have examined a Specimen of Water from Newtownhamlet, submitted to me for that purpose by The Guardians of Enniscorthy Union.

and the following are the results at which I have arrived:—

Nitrous acid	trace
Nitric acid	Small amount
Sulphate of lime	trace
Chlorine	1.092

This water is pretty clear and is free from bad odour. It contains a few particles in suspension.

It is not quite up to the standard of purity with respect to organic matter, the nitrogen and ammonia being excessive. It is not, however, a decidedly bad water, but belongs to the second class of waters, the best being first class. This is a great point in its favour.
