Masters Report Contd.

I beg to report in reply to the letter of the L. G. Board, that I was elected as Master of the Enniscorthy Workhouse in the year 1864. That after my election the late Master W. Maguire, had a month to take stock, and during that month, I was acting under his directions as Master, & M^{rs} Martin was then Matron. I issued out the food during that month to the Inmates and lodgers and never gave any Buttermilk during the time to the latter. The Matron, M^{rs} Martin, very often attended the Dairy, and I never saw her give any Buttermilk either, to tramps or casuals. I always on the admission of Male adult tramps gave them 14 Ozs of Bread and the Females 12 Ozs - The children under 5 years old always got Bread and Milk from year to year, and time to time, returned to store any food or stimulants not used by either the healthy or sick. This practice has thus gone on for years and has never been hitherto objected to, nor my attention called to it by any other Inspector or Auditor up to the present. Since Capt. Hamilton called my attention to the question of Dietary I have given the quantity allowed by the Dietary scale to tramps viz, 18 ozs of Bread and 3 naggins of Buttermilk to male adults, and 16 Ozs of Bread and 3 Naggins of Buttermilk to Female Adults on admission.

Especially as those Salaries are by no means excessive, but on the contrary below the averages of Unions of this size and importance of this -

It is not even alleged that the large expenditure of the Union is in any way attributable to the negligence, carelessness, or waste, of its officers. Why then should they be called on to suffer in consequence?

The excessive outlay is attributable mainly to one principal cause, the enormous Out-door Relief given, over which the Guardians can exercise, if they will, complete control, but for which none of the officials are in the least to blame.

Report of the Expenditure Committee Emiscorthy Board of Guardians ~~July 31st 1879~~ August 7th 1879

The Committee have held many meetings and have occupied themselves for several hours each meeting with the careful analysis of details.

The Course adopted was to institute a Comparison between the years 1869 and 1879 ending the 25th of March in each year. It will be seen that there have been several additional branches of expenditure which did not exist in 1869. Such as Sanitary arrangements - Cattle Disease Compensation Maintenance of Burial Grounds &c which have added in round numbers £720.

After carefully going through all the various items, your Committee find that the large increase in expenditure may be mainly traced to the following Causes viz

They also recommend that the Magistrates within the union be requested to reduce the salaries under the explosive act. Great comment has been made on the fact of the seeming increase of the salaries of the various officers of the Union, but on comparing them with the salaries of 1869 we do not find that this is the case to any considerable extent.
