SANITARY REPORT.

To the Guardians of Enniscorthy Union.

As the Medical Officer of Health of Killann Dispensary District, I hereby report to you that a work of much sanitary importance might well be undertaken at the present time, as it would afford some slight assistance to a few of the unemployed of the district, and no objection ought to be raised by any body, as the expense will be voluntarily borne by one of the parties most interested. I allude to the water supply of Bolamore and Wheelagower, and as Mr Byrne would be most benefitted by the improvement I am about to suggest, he is willing to have the expenses of this work assessed on his farm along in Boladurragh. Mr Byrne would do the work himself, apart from any interference of the Sanitary Authority, but as the Local Government Board gives unusual facilities for doing such works by lending money, through the Board of Guardians, at a lower rate of interest than it could otherwise be got, when the work for which it is borrowed can be shown to be of sanitary utility, he is anxious for the Sanitary Authority, in their official capacity, to direct the works to be carried out, and have the expense assessed on his holding only.

In former times, the Colclough's of Duffrey Hall, anxious to have a stream of clear water running by their residence, with much ingenuity, conceived the idea of raising a head weir in the river, high up in Boladurragh, and constructed a narrow water course from there to Duffrey Hall, about two miles distant. So cleverly was the water level found, and the stream led along through an uneven country that the people there can scarcely be persuaded that the water in the open stream does not flow against an activity. Besides supplying Duffrey Hall, this skilfully constructed water course supplied all the farms and cottages by which it flowed, in a district otherwise badly, if at all supplied with water. Now, the head weir has fallen into bad repair, and the dam, for some distance, is leaky, allowing the water to fall back and regain the river bed, which flows on a lower level beside it for some distance. I recommend that the defects in the dam and river be repaired. I further suggest that some springs in Mr. Edward Byrne's farm be connected by a drain with the water course, so as to secure a better and unfailing supply of good water. This would, in addition, drain Mr. Byrne's field, and it is in consideration of the advantage which would thus accrue to his farm, and the fact that the work on the water course and weir would all be done on his land, that he is willing to have the expense assessed thereon. I need scarcely say what an improvement, in a sanitary point of view, it would be to the dry uplands of Bolamore and Wheelagower, to have an unfailing stream of clear water flowing through them. It is on this ground that, as Medical Officer of Health, I recommend it. Some of Lord Carew's tenants would be especially benefitted by the suggested improvement.—Signed this 28th day of January, 1880.
