In reply to that portion of the Auditor's Report relative to the discharge of my duties as Relieving Officer I have to state

1st as regards the filling in of the application Books I have performed my duties in that respect so as to give the legal information to the Guardians in accordance with the headings of the Books I have gone over the application Books for the half year ending 29th Sep. 1879 which Mr. Browne audited and to which he alludes in his report and I find that each case was fully entered and answers given to each of the headings in the Books the Auditor during the time he was examining my accounts never called my attention to any entry in which I had neglected my duty in this respect. In reference to his allusion of me keeping my Office with the late R. O. I beg to say that I am Registrar of Births Deaths and Marriages for District Emmetsburg No 2 for past 4 years and had my Office in same place for 2 years before I became a Relieving Officer the late R. O. after my appointment was invited by the Board of Guardians on many occasions to attend the Guardians meetings to assist in the

out door Relief business until I became
acquainted with the duties myself and the
fact of me keeping my office in the house
with them was and is well known to the entire
Board of Guardians -

2nd as regards my habit of giving provisional
relief I have always endeavored to suit as best
I could the convenience of the poor and when
W^h Browne states that poor persons must
come a distance of 12 miles he has made
a gross mistake for such is not the case it's
not the fact that I give all orders for food
in Enniscorthy I give them in the different
villages through my district and the
Auditor should have seen this to be the
fact when examining my vouchers at the
Audit as there were vouchers before him
from Shopkeepers living in the Villages
of Blonroche Bree Mellam and Oylegate
all situate in my district and within
2 1/2 miles of the boundary of it. One case
came before the Auditor where a woman
living a distance from Enniscorthy
received her provisional relief in the town
but the reason was when in town she
requested of me to give her the order so
that she might get better dealings than
she would get in a Village otherwise she
would have got her relief in the nearest
Village to her home. In conclusion I may
be permitted to remark that the relief
is distributed to the out door Relief
recipients in the Villages named every
week and it's therefore unfair towards

me on the part of the Auditor to
insinuate that the poor must come great
distances to receive their relief. It is also
rather strange that if my books were in
the imperfect state the Auditor would
have the Local Government Board and the
Board of Guardians to believe they were
in that after a searching audit the
Auditor did not disallow a single shilling
in my accounts or surcharge a single
Guardian with a penny which I think
would not be the case if the relief given
by me was either illegal or unauthorized.
