at the University Board of Guardians
in reference to the seed rate question
at Worcester. and as the account is
rather confused. as to what took
place, I would wish the Board to
know how the matter appeared to
the magistrates, especially as I am
decidedly of opinion that inquiry
is advisable.
As shown before in the course adopted
here - the Guardians of the Division
gave orders to the small farmers for
the amount required, relying on the
Block copy of these orders.
These orders were presented to the
Worcester Board - and I think require for the

amount, on which the farmer bought the orders to the seed-distributor.

In some cases the seedman had given orders for more than the farmer had power to get. in which case the order was altered (I think by the clerk) and the reduced amount ^{ordered} given, and the seedman's books altered accordingly. So for the winter seemed regular enough, but on several occasions the supply of potatoes ran short. and parties had to go away without them, leaving their I.O.U. behind, and it was known that some parties came back once or twice without being supplied.

There was no delivery book kept to show the amount given out each day. the orders were only evidence of the

amount which the parties were entitled

to receive. and the only book said before the bench was a mere copy of these orders and ^{was} no evidence that the parties received the amount. under these circumstances the seed distributor could not swear that he had in every case given out the full amount ordered. and of course, when the parties swore that they received only a portion of what was ordered. & when it was admitted that they had tendered the money for that portion. the magistrates could only dismiss the cases.

I may mention that the impression left on my mind was that the parties were quite willing to pay for what they had received and that there was no desire on their part to cheat the
