I regret to state that during my absence on two days leave there was nearly 100 panes of Glass broken in the Male School-room, Boys' Dormitory, Lavatory, & Workshop &c. &c. The Schoolmaster could not account for how they were broken.

The Schoolmaster himself reported to me that on one of the nights during my absence the Boys collected the beds together in a heap on one side of the Dormitory (for some unknown purpose) and that he had to call the Porter and Agriculturist to his assistance, the latter had to stop all night with the Schoolmaster, otherwise the consequence might have been very serious. I therefore place the matter in the hands of the Board, as I will not be accountable for what the Boys may do. The Roman Catholic Chaplain will not be accountable for the Schoolmaster in any way.

On Friday morning last the Boys appeared somewhat disorderly. I went down and put the Boys into the school and the Trades Boys into the Workshop - on my second visit I found that one of the Boys

had struck the schoolmaster in the eye he could not tell which of them, after some inquiry I found that it was a young lad about 10 years old, named Edward Coughlan that flung the pebble at the Schoolmaster.

I had Coughlan brought before the Magistrates on Monday last, as also the other two boys that flung the iron rod at the Schoolmaster, the Magistrates postponed the case as they considered the boys so very young, (only about 10 years old each), and directed me to bring the matter before the Board in order that the Guardians might consider the propriety of ordering the boys a slight whipping.
