I protest against the motion of which Mr Bower has given notice for 22nd inst. to reduce by 25% the salaries of officers of the Cornisworthy Union.

The Board of Guardians has on two recent occasions (8th Feb and 8th March) assembled in large numbers to consider similar proposals, and on each occasion it decided against making any reduction in these salaries. Nothing has since occurred to cause any change in the opinions of the board, or to justify the renewal for the third time within two months of a proposal twice rejected.

Should the meeting on 22nd inst decide to recommend the reduction of the Salaries it will be a decision of a minority of the board, and directly contrary to the wishes and opinions of the majority, as shown by their votes on two recent occasions -

The County assizes commence on 20th inst. and in consequence many guardians may be prevented from attending the board on 22nd inst.

under these circumstances I protest against the proposal of Mr Power being carried into effect, and trust that, if passed, the Local Government Board will not assent to a reduction of salaries which would in all probability result in causing all the best officers of the union to withdraw from its service.

# Clerk's Report ..

## (Contd.)

The Clerk also read the following which he had sent to the L.G.B. as a reply to the accusations made against him on the previous Thursday he also said -

Clerk's Office, April 16th, 1908.  
To the Secretary Local Government Board.

SIR—In reply to the document forwarded with copy of minutes of the proceedings of April 15th as to my conduct at the Board's meeting on April 5th, I beg to say, for the information of the Local Government Board, that the statements made therein are very misleading, are in some particulars totally incorrect, and altogether form an incorrect description of what actually occurred.

I beg to refer the Local Government Board to the copy of the minutes of proceedings of April 5th for an exact recital of facts, minutes since duly read to the Board and signed by the Chairman without any exception being taken thereto. I beg to say I did not in any shape or way assume the office of Chairman. I took my usual seat to the left of the chair, and remained in it till pressed from both sides of the room to take the chair, and by so doing to put an end to the dispute which was waxing warm all round. I did not state that it was usual for me "to take it at the first meeting of the new Board." I could not do so, as since my election as Clerk in 1876 I have never even once done so, although I knew it was the custom for Clerks of Unions in general so to do. I had not done so on any previous occasion. The usual practice here has been to elect a temporary Chairman till the Chairman for the year was chosen. As stated in the minutes Mr. George Murphy proposed Mr. Maurice Murphy as temporary Chairman, but Mr. Haughton objected and proposed Mr. Moffatt, J.P. Mr. Casey, the present D.V.C. of the Board interposed, stating that the Clerk was the proper person to take the chair at first, as in other Unions, and proposed I should do so. So far from assuming it, I at first demurred to this, but at length acceded seeing it was the wish of so many guardians that I should do so, even some of Mr. Maurice Murphy's friends calling on him strenuously to vacate the chair in my favour and to let the business proceed. When I did take the chair I stated distinctly it was by request, and on a formal motion duly proposed and seconded *namine contradicente*, and with the express object of settling the dispute going on by polling the matter. I beg also to say that so far from refusing to proceed with the business while Mr. Maurice Murphy occupied the chair, the fact is, that when he took it, on the motion of Mr. Geo. Murphy, I stood up, opened the minute book, and was about to read the minutes of the previous Board-day's proceedings when I was rudely interrupted, the noise increasing, and some of the guardians shouting out various proposals. I remarked to Mr. Maurice Murphy that I could not possibly take down the proceedings amidst such confusion, and that till the question of the temporary chairmanship was settled, I would not attempt it, and I suggested to him that it might be as well to allow me to take the chair, and the whole dispute would be settled in a few minutes. This he did after a short delay. My taking the chair, be it an error or not, expedited the progress of the business of the Board considerably. I respectfully submit that under all the circumstances, I was justified in acquiescing in the wish of the large majority of the Board, and that I did not, as alleged, outstep my duties, or perform any illegal act.

"I wish to add to this, that till told by Capt. Hamilton on last Board-day, I was not aware that the general regulations had made any change in the usual mode of the election of chairmen. I did not think they were meant to convey that the accidental appendage to the guardianship of the office of a chairman for one year was prolonged beyond the time of the guardianship itself, the basis on which the honor rested. If I have erred, I have certainly erred in good company, as I find a large number of the Unions throughout Ireland have made no change whatever in the mode of the election of their officers for the year. In one newspaper for instance the "Leinster Leader" of April 7th, I find the usual mode adopted in Carlow, where the Clerk is an officer of long standing and experience, in Naas, whose clerk is President of the Irish Poor Law Officers Association, and 30 years in office, in Athy and in Edenderry. In the last named, the chair was taken by the Returning Officer, Mr. Bar, by whom the election of the three chairmen was carried on. I only took the chair as a preparatory step. If all these elections be invalid, the Unions throughout Ireland will be in a strange state of confusion.

... in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report

thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election)

When he had read this Mr. A. Cullen Senr. at once handed in the following which was adopted -

Resolved—That our Clerk having signed some of the statements contained in the resolution of this Board on Thursday, the 13th inst., relative to the appointment of Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Deputy Vice-Chairman, this resolution however passed the Board on the 15th inst. without a single dissenting voice, and the gentleman (Mr. Moffatt, J.P.) who took the chair for the time being, instead of the legal chairman the previous Board-day, he (Mr. Moffatt) being also the chairman presiding at the Board the 15th inst., (and whom we are aware of being a very intimate friend of the clerk's) never dissented, or stated that any part of the resolution was false, though he was present at the entire proceedings; but the clerk has the impudent audacity of stating before our much esteemed and respected Inspector (Captain Hamilton), that the "whole thing" was fallacious; and without any authority from the Chairman, began to cancel certain portions of the resolution by crossing it with his pen, until Capt. Hamilton interfered and reprimanded him for what he was doing and saying.

We now wish to confirm the statement contained in our resolution of last Thursday (15th inst.) and several of the guardians who were present at the commencement of the proceedings of the Board on the 4th inst. who saw and heard everything that happened, are now ready to make sworn declarations as to the accuracy of the statements embodied in the resolution.

We most respectfully and urgently request the Local Government Board to send down their inspector to hold a sworn investigation into this and other matters connected with the Union, and in which we believe the clerk has taken the part of a partisan, in his capacity as Clerk of the Union and Returning Officer.

The guardians are therefore reluctantly compelled to record a want of confidence in their clerk for the illegal, unfair, and one-sided way in which we consider he directs the business of the Board, and endeavours to set us astray. As for example (which cannot be contradicted) he distinctly informed the Board on the 5th inst. that should Mr. Maurice Murphy (the Deputy Vice-Chairman) take the chair, in his capacity as Deputy Vice-Chairman he (the clerk) would not insert the election of chairman, &c., on the minutes.

Several other proofs can be given as to Mr. Keohle's interference with the business of the Board, though his opinion being unasked for, so we confidently hope that justice can be done to us by the Local Government Board—1st, by nullifying the election of officers for the current year, and by dealing with the clerk as he deserves; and, by granting our request as to the sworn inquiry.

## Right of Chair

Mr Roche then was proceeding with the revision of the Relieving officers' books, when Mr. Moffatt, Vice Chairman of the Board, entered the room, and walked up to the chair.

Mr Roche remaining in it, Mr. Moffatt asked "if he would not allow him to take the chair but Mr Roche declined to do so, unless the Board wished it."

Mr. Moffatt then said "I believe I am justified in using a sufficient amount of force to assert my authority and placed his hands on Mr. Roche's shoulders, asking him to give way."

Mr Roche still refusing, Mr. Moffatt said "I declare the Board adjourned, and any business done after this will be illegal."

He then left the room

The Board proceeded however with the usual business

At the Conclusion of the Board's Business, the Chairman called on the Clerk, and Ordered him to produce any other letters or correspondence.

The Clerk then read Communications under the C.D.D., as to various matters and some orders were made, after which the following Resolution was adopted
