

We therefore condemn in the strongest manner possible <sup>any</sup> persons taking grass from Landlords or people of that class, by auction or otherwise, in preference to tenant farmers, because it is simply tempting and encouraging such Landlords to evict any poor tenant farmer who is not able to pay the exorbitant rackrent he is under, and because it is disheartening & discouraging to tenant farmers necessitated to sell their grass to enable them to live to see their brother farmers, especially those who are expected should be their best friends, patronizing Landlords in preference to them.
