CLERK'S REPORT—NEWTOWNBARRY SANITARY CASE.  
 I beg to report having attended on Saturday, the 24th inst., at Newtownbarry Petty Sessions, according to the order of the board, in the case of the Guardians v. Henry Connolly, to proceed against him for the full penalty and costs, to which he had made himself liable, for not having carried out the order of the Sanitary Authority as to the removal of his slaughter-house from proximity to dwelling-houses. It being the first case in Newtownbarry in which a penalty was enforced, the Court gave an order for £1 fine and £1 costs, hoping it would be a sufficient warning to others noticed from time to time by the Sanitary Authority to carry out its directions without delay.






