

DOCTOR'S REPORT.

Dr. Greene forwarded the quarterly return ending June 30th, during which time there were 257 cases visited by him. There are a good many still careless about bringing their children for vaccination within the prescribed time, whilst others deem it quite unnecessary to have them inspected subsequent to vaccination. There are 22 defaulters, and some have eluded the Vaccination Act for years. Many houses in the village of Ferns are in an unsanitary state, while some of those in the surrounding districts are unfit for human habitation. The water supply to the village of Ferns is both deficient in quantity, and in most cases bad in quality. There had been two isolated cases of typhus fever in the district, both of which are, however, now convalescent.

[This at the end of each half-year, in pursuance of Articles 30 & 31 of the General Rules for Dispensary Districts, dated 29th November, 1869.]




