At the request of the Dispensary Committee of Clonroche District, I have inspected houses lately occupied by James Murphy, Patrick Dillon, Bartie Coleman, Edward Buckley, John Dillon, Peter Redmond, and John St. Leger, all men who have obtained labourers' cottages owing to the unsanitary condition of their houses. The houses are still very unsanitary. They are all (but one) again occupied, as many as seven sleeping in St. Leger's, a house of one apartment. I would ask the Board to have them placed in a sanitary state or else closed. I also beg to draw your attention to the unsanitary condition of the Clonroche National School, the privies of which are built against the back of the school, immediately beside the windows. The master has informed me that it is impossible, during the summer, to open any of those windows owing to the stench that at once rushes in, and I may add, personally, that whilst I was there it was really disgusting.
