## PROSECUTION OF MR. ROBERT POWER, EX-P.L.G.

Mr. Fortune proposed the following, which, he said, referred to a very old friend of his—"That we beg to tender to Mr. Robert Power our sincere sympathy under his present prosecution, well knowing from past experience that such prosecutions end in several months in jail. We know well, too, that Mr. Power has in this board-room and elsewhere, for several years been the unflinching advocate of the rights of the tenant-farmers and labourers of this county in maintaining their just claims to the fruits of their toil and industry, and we faithfully promise him now that we shall use our most strenuous exertions, whether here in our native land or elsewhere, in opposition to the mean tactics pursued by his and our oppressors in our life and death struggles for the homes in which we were born, and to which he has devoted the best years of his life. We, therefore, look upon his prosecution as a proof, indeed, with our past experience, if such were needed to proclaim to the world in indelible language the falsehood of Balfour's boast of the equality of the laws by which Englishmen and Irishmen are governed, as witnessed by the fair treatment lately shown to the combination of the London dock labourers, when combining for their mutual advantage, as compared to the brutal treatment meted out to Irish farmers, who combine for any equally laudable object."

Chairman—As far as I knew Mr. Power he was the most energetic member of this board when he was at it.

The resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Kearns, was adopted unanimously.





## ENNISCORTHY DISPENSARY COMMITTEE.

A meeting called by circular was held at the Market House on the evening of the 15th. The following members were present:—Messrs. John Cullin, J.P.; Peter Ryan, and P. W. Casey. It was proposed by Mr. Casey, seconded by Mr. Ryan and passed—That Mr. Cullin be elected chairman for the year. Proposed by Mr. Ryan, seconded by Mr. Casey and passed—That Albert Davis be vice-chairman. Mr. P. W. Casey was appointed hon. sec. Dr. Kelly attended with his books and accounts, which were signed and approved of. The following was the report made by Dr. Kelly:—"At Oylegate I have requested Mrs. Murphy to change the dispensary from the upper floor of her house to the ground floor apartment, as I find it is very inconvenient to old people and people suffering from injuries to ascend a stairs. We require two chairs and a bench for Oylegate, as these articles have fallen to pieces from age. I have also ordered, subject to your approval a chair suitable for examining patients in Oylegate. The medicines received were of good quality, and the charges for medicines not on the contract moderate. The health of the district is very good, no disease of importance existing at present. The water supply of Enniscorthy town is very bad in quality, and short in quantity. It is almost impossible to get a clean specimen of water for the use of the dispensary. I should feel obliged if the committee will call the attention of the urban sanitary authority to this bad state of things."

An estimate for repairs at the Enniscorthy Dispensary was received from Mr. P. J. Stokes, George's-street, which was approved of and recommended to be carried out at once. The estimate for medicines and appliances for surgical purposes was considered and approved of.

Only three members attended, notwithstanding that he had given due notice by post to each of the committee, including Mr. John Flynn, chairman of the board, who was in town on the day of meeting, and did not attend. After half an hour there were only two members present, and he had actually to send through the town for the third member, in order to form a quorum. In view of this the action of the chairman of the board of guardians was absurd. The act of three members of the committee was more legal than the absence of 33 who never attend. Under these circumstances he (Mr. Casey) declined to summon another meeting on this subject. If they would refer to the dispensary minute book they would see how difficult it was to form a quorum.
